FOR THE FARMER.

HINTS AS TO FARM IMPROVEMENTS.

The Best Time to Spread Fertilizer—Seek to Develop the Farm to the Highest Possible Standard.

Only the rich can afford to keep poor cows and they don't. "The man behind the cow" is useful, so is the man in front of her with the feed bucket.

He who grows wheat at all should set his mark at thirty bushels.

The fruit grower that hasn't time to read is attending a slow and doubtful school.

Does every acre of your farm earn something for you every year? If not, why not?

That milk can be absolutely clean, is it? Well, put the lid on tight. Place the can near a hot stove, where it will be heated so that you can hardly hold your hand on it. Now pull off the lid and smell the air that comes out of it. "Whew!" you say. There! does that smell come from an absolutely clean can?

If some men could compute the time taken in running about from place to place for forks, they could soon buy a number of them. A neighbor told me that it required two hours a day going to the well, pumping enough water for his stock and family. This time, at \$1 a day, would amount to \$73 a year, which would put in a good mill. We often lose sight of such things.

Clover is, and will continue to be, the sheet anchor of successful agriculture in the north, and the man who is careless and indifferent about it, or has a wet, acid soil, where it is extremely hard to get a stand, must look about and correct the trouble. If he does not, the time will certainly come when he will be forced to the wall.

Whether a man expects to sell his farm or not, he should endeavor to bring it to assist where, if it has to be sold, it can be disposed of to advantage, instead of at a sacrifice.

While here and there a man may succeed with a specialty not common in his neighborhood, the true course for farmers in general, is to stick to their farming and try continually to farm better with the crops that they have been long accustomed to, and leave the fads to those who have the money to throw away.

Experiments conducted by the United States department of agriculture have shown that manure left in heaps and exposed for a considerable time to air and weather when not frozen loses one-third of the nitrogen, one-fifth of the potash and one-seventh of the phosphoric acid. These facts furnish a powerful argument with reference to the wisdom of applying manure to the land at the earliest moment practicable.

The trade value of a fertilizer does not necessarily indicate its exact agricultural value. The value of a given fertilizer simply shows its cost in general markets. The agricultural value of a fertilizer shows its capacity in producing certain agricultural crops and depends not only upon the position of the fertilizer in the soil upon which the fertilizer is used, but also upon the physical condition of the soil, the mode of cultivation, the season and the crop to be raised. Experience alone can determine the general fitness and approximate agricultural value of a compound commercial fertilizer and fertilizing materials.

The Canadian live stock commissioner has bought fifty young dairy cows in calf, two Holstein bulls and a number of Berkshire hogs for the Government of Orange River Colony, South Africa. He will be accompanied from here by another Canadian, Mr. Palmer, besides being director of agriculture, has a seat in the executive council of the colony.

A representative of the Garcia-Jacobson company, Covent Garden, London, apple importers, says, Mr. Garcia, one of the judges at the Colonial Exhibition, was much impressed with the quality of British Columbia apples, especially the Oregon and New town variety. In consequence of this his and other large firms are willing to do business provided that the railway companies provide favorable freight rates and necessary cold storage. This will act in opposition to

United States, but it is not thought that it will affect the output of apples from eastern Canada, which are of a different variety.

Salary of A Banker. A "junior" entering will probably receive \$200 per annum, and an annual increase of \$100 till his salary is \$300 or \$350, when ability (or occasionally "pull") will determine his subsequent advancement. Some of the larger banks, realizing the special risks run by tellers of losing money, allow "month \$100 to \$200 a year "Risk Fund" which is put to their credit at least office annually, and is available against any large loss, the balance remaining being paid over to them on leaving the office. "Box" for good, usually to fill a higher position. Certain living allowances are also granted by some banks to their clerks in the larger cities and in the north-west, but form an addition to, and are not a part of, their regular salary. A manager's salary will vary greatly, according to the size of the town and the bank he represents, but \$1,200 to \$1,500 a year, and a house, together with light, heat and various "pickings," may be put down as a fair average, though \$5,000 and upwards would not be considered out of the way in a large city.
