LACHANCE HAS JOINED THE MONTREAL CLUB.
Baltimore is Carrying Six Players—A Fight to Oust George Stallings—Notes from Many Fields.
Brooklyn has a Malay in centre field.
Frank Milley, the local player, has been released by Utica.
Clymer, who graduated from Buffalo may be replaced in the Pittsburg outfield by Howard.
The critics agree that McGinnity and Mathewson are in as fine form as ever in their lives just now.
Manager Harley, Toronto, and Murphy, Buffalo, were fined \$10 each for their mix-up at Buffalo.
Pitcher Maurice Wolfe, once with Toronto, has been released by the Coatesville team of the Independent League.
Vinaor, the Eastern League batting leader of last year, has "jumped" the Cleveland Club and signed with Harrisburg.
The New York champions are now playing up to their best form and better than last season, according to Fred Tenney.
Providence has released third baseman Aubrey to Albany. Aubrey had a surgical operation just before the season opened.
Pitcher Jesslyn is doing great work on the slab for Providence. He won his game yesterday. The Boston Americans turned him over to that club.
Baltimore is carrying six players at present, and all are good ones. They are Burrell, Adkins, Welch, Mason, McNeil and Wilton. All except Welch are in good shape.
George Lachance, formerly first baseman for the Boston Americans, has been signed by Montreal to play first base. George Lachance is considered one of the best fielding first basemen in the business.
The Buffalo team is not as strong as last year. Brown, at third, is not in Courtney's class as a hitter, and Hill is hardly as fast as Clymer. Murphy, the big first baseman, looks very good. He fields well and apparently can bat some.
Conn. of Providence, made his first start of the season on Sunday out of 123 chances. If he continues to improve as rapidly as he has done since being shifted to that position, Conn will soon take rank with the best first basemen in the Eastern League.
Albion of Baltimore was treated to an awful pounding Tuesday. Halligan and Keister made home runs and Bean, Keister, Clement, McCauley and Woods doubles in the first two innings when thirteen runs were scored. Halligan, Clement and Keister each had three hits.
Ban Johnson is to help out Pat Powers, of the Eastern League, in his fight to oust George Stallings, of Buffalo; George Toban, of Louisville, and Howard Griffiths, of Jersey City, from baseball forever. Johnson and Stallings never did hitch, though the Buffalo man while with Detroit, would stand for the fat man's "sovereign hearing ways," and was finally compelled to give up the St. Louis Detroit baseball. He went to Buffalo, and everyone knows his success since then.

SURVEYORS ON STRIKE.
Work Ceased on Extension of B. and W. R. R.
Survey work on the extension of the Brookville and Westport railway, westward, from Westport towards North Bay, is temporarily suspended. The men have not received their wages for seven weeks, and are on strike. A week ago, when six weeks wages were due, they ceased work, but at the urgent request of those in charge of the survey, who were desirous of completing a certain piece of work, the men continued to continue another week, and last Saturday, when money was not forthcoming, they left in a body for their homes.
Most of the surveyors and their assistants belong to Kingston, and they reached the city Saturday evening. Here they will remain until their wages are paid. The extension of the road is being financed by New Yorkers, who have been notified of the condition of affairs, and who are expected to at once forward sufficient money to meet the necessities due the men. The work has been carried forward a short distance west of Bolingbrook. Prof. R. Carr-Harris is in charge of the work.

READY FOR RACE.
Great Trans-Atlantic Race on May 16th.

New York, May 15.—Aboard the fleet yachts lying in the bay that are to take part in the great trans-Atlantic race to begin tomorrow, there was much activity to-day. Everything was being put in ship-shape in anticipation of the start. Public interest in the contest is of the keenest sort and it is expected that thousands of persons will go out to the Hook tomorrow to witness the beginning of the race for the emperor's trophy.
It will be the first time in nearly a score of years that there has been a yacht race across the Atlantic. The last race sailed across the ocean was in 1877, when the Coronet defeated the Dauntless. The race was started off Bay Bridge in March of that year and the two yachts raced to Queens-town. The stakes were \$10,000 a side. The Coronet won, covering 2,949 miles and making the voyage in fourteen days, twenty hours and thirty minutes.
Previous to this race there were several other contests of the kind that excited great interest. The first ocean race was between the American schooner Henrietta, Fleetwing and Vesta, in 1866, the course being from Sandy Hook to the Needles, Pierre L'Heritier, owner of the Vesta, George and Franklin Osgood, the Fleetwing, and James Gordon Bennett, the Henrietta. The stakes were \$30,000 a corner, making \$90,000 in all. The Henrietta won the race, though both of the other contestants came in but eight hours behind.
The next race was between the Cambria, owned by James Ashbury, of London, and the Dauntless, owned by
