TORONTO STRIKERS

MARBLE WORKERS OUT-PIANO MEN GO BACK.

Four Christian Scientists, Charged with the Death of Wallace Goodfellow, from Typhoid Fever, Are Up for Trial.

Toronto, May 15.—The strike of piano action workers has been declared off, and after ten weeks of idleness the men lay down tools to work on the old conditions.

The Marble Workers' union declared a strike, the piano men going out from twenty-two to twenty-seven and one-half cents per hour.

The trial of the four Christian Scientists, charged with the death of Wallace Goodfellow, from typhoid fever, was commenced this morning at the assizes before Justice Macgillivray and a jury.
