AUDITOR'S REPORT UPON CONDITIONS OF MUNICIPAL FINANCES.

How Provincial Auditor Laing Found the Books of Townships, Villages and Other Municipalities.

The eighth annual report of J. B. Laing, Ontario provincial auditor, just issued, contains some interesting information touching the financial condition of municipalities, from which has been gleaned the following:

Township of Wolfe Island - Equalized assessment of township, \$637,400. Collector's roll, \$2,300; all paid in about \$200. Tax rate, about 24 cents on the dollar, including school charges.

Township of King - Total receipts for 1903, \$3,313.47; total payments for 1903, \$2,907.74; balance in Ontario Bank of \$405.73. Assessment of village equalized, \$115,000. Collector's roll, \$2,907.52; paid in full, \$2,907.52.

Township of Howe Island - Total assessment of township (1903), \$62,812. Collector's roll, \$1,524.31; paid in full, \$1,524.31.

Township of Garden Island - Total assessment of township, \$1,102,255. Collector's roll, \$15,471.60; nearly all paid in full.

Township of Storrington - Total receipts for 1903, \$9,155.97. Payments, \$9,153.59. Assessment of municipality, \$421,942.

Township of Hinchinbrooke - Total receipts for 1903, \$6,541.95; total payments, \$6,280.73, leaving a balance in treasurer's hands of \$261.22.

Township of Loughborough - Total assessment of township, \$403,020. Collector's roll, \$7,982.79; all paid except \$150.

Township of Pitsburg - Total receipts for 1903, \$21,735.01; total payments for 1903, \$17,993.89; balance on hand in bank, \$3,741.12.

Township of Hinchinbrooke - Total receipts for 1903, \$6,541.95; total payments, \$6,280.73, leaving a balance in treasurer's hands of \$261.22.

Township of Palmerston, North and South Canoto - Total assessment of municipality, \$66,482. Collector's roll, \$2,288.16; all paid.

DISTRICT MEETING.

METHODISTS TO HOLD VARIOUS CONVENTIONS.

At the Methodist district meeting on Wednesday afternoon, these superannuated ministers were recommended to be continued: A. Drennan, S. Shibley, John Ferguson, Joseph Follick, W. Short, James O'Hara, A. R. Orser, T. C. Brown, E. S. Shorey, W. Sanderson.

Oliver Mowat Eaton was allowed to withdraw from the ministry. Rev. W. T. C. Brown read the obituary prepared in memory of Rev. Dr. Philip. A number of ministers including Dr. Antliff, bore brotherly testimony in tribute to the departed.

On motion it was ordered that a committee of three, nominated by the chair, prepare and introduce a resolution in commendation of the late Rev. Messrs. Follick, Drennan and Short. Revs. Craig, Crummy and Tucker were named.

The standing of probationers was further examined. J. M. Shaver was orally questioned, and on resolution he was recommended to be continued on probation.

By resolution it was decided that one or more conventions for increasing the efficiency of the churches be held in the district in the coming year.
