Russian Admiralty Knows Nothing of Baltic Fleet's Movements-Linivitch Says He Dislodged Japanese Force of Cavalry and Infantry. Special to the Whig. Hong Kong, May 23.-The British steamer, Isworth, which sailed from Saigon, last Wednesday, reports that she passed more than fifty Russian transports; several of which were on fire. The burning vessels were laden with coal. There is no definite news of the Baltic fleet. The belief grows that Admiral Rojestvensky is feinting the purpose of gaining time to clean and equip Admiral Nebogatoff's squadron.

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Dislodged Japanese Force. St. Petersburg, May 23.-Gen. Linivitch, in a despatch from the front, dated May 21st, announces that two Russian detachments occupied the valleys of the Naak and Khanda rivers, westward of Nanchang, on the Mandarin Road, after dislodging forces of Japanese cavalry and infantry. The despatch adds that Gen. Mertynoff's detachment, from Tadiu, also drove back the Japanese advanced cavalry, near Fuchang. Linivitch also reported fighting near Sha-ho, May 18th, but did not give the result.

Japan's Terms Of Peace. A despatch from Tokio names Japan's terms of peace to Russia. The principal clause reads thus: Should Russia ask for peace we shall insist on an unconditional armistice, and when negotiations are opened we shall require Russia to return Manchuria to China, renounce her claims on Korea, cede Saghalien to us, remove permanently the fortifications of Vladivostok and pay an indemnity of \$1,000,000. Such liberal terms will afford no occasion for intervention. The despatch goes on to say, however, that the time has not yet come to talk peace.

Bazaar Pictures England's Kings. Special to the Whig. London, May 23.-Queen Alexandra presided, to-day, at the opening of the great historical bazaar in Beaver Yard, Westminster, for which preparations have been going forward for many weeks. The affair is one of the most elaborate of its kind attempted in recent years. It is intended to illustrate the manners and costumes of all the periods of English history from the reign of William the Conqueror to that of King Edward VII. Notable among the participants are Mrs. Choate, wife of the American ambassador, the Duchess of Marlborough, Mrs. Patrick Campbell, the Duchess of Norfolk, the Duchess of Sutherland, Mrs. Asquith, the Duchess of Somerset, and the Duchess of Devonshire. The proceeds of the bazaar, which will continue until the end of the week, will be donated to Westminster Hospital.

To Blacklist Millionaires. Sioux City, Ia., May 23.-Great financiers who achieve wealth by oppressive and unscrupulous methods will be blacklisted and no more funds will be sought of them by the Congregational church, according to Dr. Washington Gladden, who was interviewed at length on this theme while attending the state convention of his church here. Dr. Gladden says his money will not only not be solicited but will be rejected when tendered.

Empire Day In Toronto. Special to the Whig. Toronto, Ont., May 23.-In the celebration of Empire Day, by the Toronto school children, this afternoon, it is anticipated that quite 25,000 children will take part. The governor-general will witness the march past from a position in front of the Parliament Buildings and afterwards will receive the flowers for the decoration of the monument to Queen Victoria.

King Peter's Cabinet. Belgrade, Serbia, May 23.-The Pa-tia ministry has resigned. The cabinet formed December 11th, 1904, under the premiership of M. Pasic, resigned February 6th last, in consequence of court intrigues against the premier. King Peter requested the ministers to retain office until he had conferred with the politicians, and the cabinet resignation was withdrawn February 5th.

Blood-Stained Belgrade May See Another Tragedy. New York, May 23.-The Sun has the following cable from London: Belgrade advices show that a critical condition of affairs exists in the blood-stained capital of Serbia. The latest attacks of the Serbian journals upon the present regime recall those preceding the catastrophe of June 11th, 1903.

The personal animosities against the king are most violent. One newspaper openly accuses him of compassing the death of a Serbian actress, lest the Queen Draga episode be repeated with the crown prince. There is no disguising the public admiration of the claims of Prince Nikola of Montenegro to the throne, which are daily advocated.

Allusions to King Peter's incapacity are not even veiled. The king is afraid to approve or disapprove the new laws, and is leaving all to parliament, which will be summoned to meet shortly. It is hoped that the house will reject the loan, on the ground that it is nearly double what was required to insure the fall of the Pasic cabinet.

Premier Balfour is said to have purchased a large estate in Manitoba. Six men were killed by the explosion of a railroad engine at Columbus, Ohio.

Mackerel have struck in on the Nova Scotia coast and the fishermen are active. The bye elections in North London and North Oxford will be held on June 13th.

Negotiations looking to the ending of the teamsters' strike are again in progress. Unprecedented disorder reigns in the British House of Commons over the subject of colonial preference.

Arthur Caron, Montreal, fell under an electric car, and had both legs amputated. His life will be saved. Miss Margaret Jaloniek, the nurse who disappeared from St. Luke's Hospital, New York, last Wednesday, is in Buffalo.

When the legislature meets at two o'clock to-day it will sit right through till the business of the session is completed. It is reported that Dr. Judson P. Clark, provincial forester, will be made professor of forestry at the University of Toronto.

Robert Shaw, a negro, supposedly insane, has killed Deputy Sheriff W. C. Brown and wounded seven other men near Wallman, Ky. Charles F. Jackson, colored, the slayer of Charles F. Ames, Rochester, N.Y., was sentenced to serve nine years and six months in the Auburn state prison.

Lord and Lady Strathcona will attend the unveiling in St. Paul's cathedral to-morrow of the memorial to the colonial soldiers who fell in the South African war. The Steamer "Nebogatt", St. Pauls, was wrecked by a boiler explosion, and Ralph Welsh was killed, Engineer Robert Fisher fatally injured and several other employees received less serious injuries.

H. Clay Grubb, acquitted, Saturday, on the charge of murdering his brother-in-law, was ambushed with a companion in a buggy, one of his chief witnesses, yesterday, nine miles from Salisbury, N.C. Both were wounded. Grubb recognized one member of the party of ambushers.

No Birthday Honors. Special to the Whig. Toronto, May 23.-There will be no birthday honors on May 24th. According to a cable from the colonial secretary the honor list each year hereafter will be published on the day observed as the king's birthday in the Old Country. This anniversary is usually set for the last week in June.

SENT TO CANADA.

Detroit, Mich., May 23.-An Ashland, Wis., despatch says: "During the present season at least one hundred thousand tons of Brotherhood, Yale and New Era ore will be shipped from Ashland to the Algoma Steel Co., at the Canadian Soo. This port has never before shipped over one-third this amount to Canadian ports, the business starting in 1902, with a half dozen cargoes. The Canadian ships Ironopolis, Lenfield, Stratheoun, Ronschaven and Fallickian, are now engaged in the trade."

NOT OUT YET. Bat His Release Will Soon Occur. Belleville, Ont., May 23.-There seems to be no doubt that F. J. Rielly, the ballot box expert and ex-college professor, will be released from custody in a day or two. Dr. Farley, jail physician, has recommended to the authorities that Rielly be released on the ground that his health, both bodily and mentally, is suffering severely, and that his detention for the full year would result in the gravest consequences. Rielly is still in jail here, but it is believed that his release is only a matter of a day or two.

A WHITE GIRL Being Brought Up By Indians Near Orillia. Orillia, May 23.-Parties near Orillia have written to J. J. Kelso, superintendent of neglected children, stating that Indians near there have a white girl, about seven years of age, whom they are bringing up as one of themselves. The department of Indian affairs, at Ottawa, has been asked to look into the matter.

After An Ex-Employee. Special to the Whig. Montreal, May 23.-A warrant has been issued by Judge Desnoyers, for the arrest of John Walsh, a former employe of the American Express company. Police officers have been trying to execute the warrant, but so far have not succeeded. Theft of \$600 is the amount mentioned in the warrant but, it is understood, the amount missing is considerably larger.

The G. T. E. Appealing. Special to the Whig. Toronto, May 23.-The Grand Trunk railway company is appealing to the court of appeal against a judgment making it liable for one-third of the cost of the Yonge street bridge. This work cost \$12,000, and the city and Canadian Pacific each paid one-half, pending the result of the action against the Grand Trunk.
