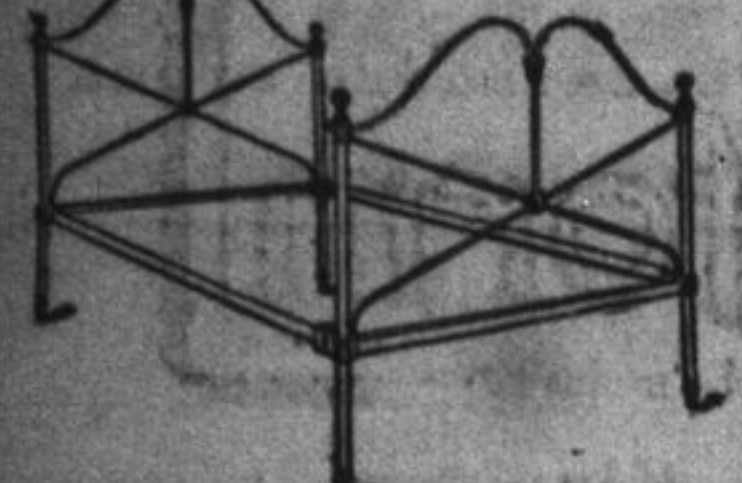

## FINE VICTORIA DAY

### FIVE THOUSAND VISITORS CAME TO TOWN.

Perfect Weather Favored the Celebration—Military Review at Barrfield—Parade Was Concluded Earlier Than Usual.

The chief requisite for a successful celebration is bright weather. For the fourth year in succession, the weather for Kingston's observance of the 24th of May, now Victoria day, was perfect. The celebration was a genuine success, and the committee that had charge was thoroughly satisfied.

There were about 5,000 visitors, of whom the G. T. R. trains brought 1,000; the K. & P. and B. of Q. railroads, the Folger boats, 1,500, and other steamers, 400. There were not half as many as last year from Northern New York State, the total being about 1,200. Of these, 700 came from Syracuse, Watertown and Cape Vincent. The steamer New Island Wanderer had 250 from Thousand Islands points; the steamer Castane, 150 from the Adirondack coast; the steamer America, 400 from Ogdensburg, Brockville, Rockport and Gananoque; the steamer Island Belle, 100 from river points; the steamer Aloha, 200 from Bay ports. The number of visitors was larger than expected, on account of attractions elsewhere. H. S. Folger had counted upon the "White Squadron" steamers bringing so many. The railroads were well represented.

No elaborate street decorations were attempted, but enough colors were hung out to brighten the thoroughfares and give the town a holiday and national celebration aspect. The aquatic sports kept the crowds well divided in the morning. Princess street being somewhat relieved of its usually overcrowded condition. The Gananoque and Deseronto bands, directed by Capt. W. J. Williams, chief stationed on the K. & P. railway lawn. The crowds were decidedly orderly, and there was less drunkenness than is usual on such festive days. The small boy who was seen throwing his evidence from daylight and continued in ceaseless operation till the bonfire of the night had smoldered.

### The Military Parades.

The military portion of the celebration was confined to garrison corps, only the Royal Canadian Field Artillery and the 14th Princess of Wales' Own Rifles participating. At 10.30 a.m. these troops were drawn up in line on Barrfield, parade ground, where many a review took place on the same national day in by gone years. The inspecting officers were: Gen. Gordon, District Commander in Chief; command; Lieut.-Col. Williams, chief staff officer, and Lieut.-Col. Young, district assistant adjutant general. Quite a large crowd of spectators was in attendance. There was no royal salute fired by the guns or the Rifles, this taking place only on the sovereign's birthday. There was a general salute and then the march past, the column going by the saluting base in splendid order. The Rifles went past in column and quarter column, and the artillery at the walk and at the gallop. The troops then formed in column of route and original ground and giving another royal salute, the troops formed in column of route, and proceeded back to the city. Thousands witnessed the parade through the down town streets, to the striking music of the 14th brass and bugle bands. The military were back from the review ground earlier than expected, having reached the market square at 11.15 o'clock, and being dismissed at private parades at 11.30. The artillery and volunteers were highly pleased over the early conclusion of the parade. Major Cunningham was in command of the 14th, which turned out 300 strong. The artillery was commanded by Lieut.-Col. Ogilvie. Lieut.-Col. Fages commanded the brigade.

## MARINE INTELLIGENCE.

### What is Going on About the Harbor.

At Craig's wharf, Steamers Persia and Melbourne down; Lake Michigan up, yesterday.

The steamer North King leaves tomorrow for Charlotte on her first trip of the season.

The steamship Ellen was at Craig's wharf yesterday, with an excursion from Gananoque.

The steamship Navajo, from Montreal, with general freight, is at Richardson's wharf-unloading.

At Swift's wharf, Steamers Pictou down; Hamilton, up; Castane, from Clayton; Island Belle, from Ogdensburg, yesterday; Rideau King, to Ottawa this morning.

J. C. TV company, wharf, S.S. Finmount and consors cleared for Chicago; tug Emerson from Oswego with two coal-laden barges and cleared down with those and two grain-laden barges; tug Hall, up with two light barges.

Superintendent Rees, of the government dry dock, has received orders to have the pier which was damaged by the steamer Scout explosion and fire, repaired. The cost will be about \$1,500. S. Grimshaw has been appointed foreman and will attend to the rebuilding.

The steamer Spray of Alexandria Bay, has been sold to the hotel owners at Tomago Lake. Thomas Crate, formerly of Kingston, is manager of the hotel. A couple of other old boats from around here have been taken up there to go into commission, and there is probably hope for others.

The schooner Bissell, which grounded on Cataraqui Island, on Monday, while towing behind the steamer Burkhead, was taken to Ogdensburg on Tuesday, and discharged her lumber. The accident was caused by the schooner's steering gear getting out of order, causing her to sheer. Her bow was knocked off and planking ripped.

In inspecting the equipment of the steamer St. Lawrence, U. S. Inspector Moller, of Oswego, put too vigorous a test on one of the life boats, which gave away under the strain. Mariners say the test was far too vigorous for the life boats of a river steamer, thirteen men being in the boat when it was let down from the davits. The United States inspectors are becoming stricter in their examination of vessels.

## AT THE GRAND.

### The Plays of the Past Two Nights.

At the Grand Opera House on Tuesday evening, "The Fatal Wedding" was played at popular prices to a medium sized house. The play is a somewhat sensational melodrama with several good features. The company, while not altogether high class, gave a fair interpretation which satisfied the majority of the spectators.

On Wednesday afternoon and evening "My Friend the Enemy" was produced, but was hardly up to expectations. Miss Lila Blow, the leading lady, had too highly pitched voice to be effective. With the company, Frank Esler, who will be remembered as the former star "Magic Cap" player in "The Show Girl." The company had no scenery.

## FELL FROM BALLOON

### AERONAUT INJURED AT THE FAIR GROUNDS.

Lost His Hold on the Parachute Bar—Fortunately He Had Risen Only Twenty-Five Feet—His Injuries Not Severe.

The balloon ascension at the fair grounds, Wednesday afternoon very nearly ended in a fatality. William H. Allen, the Rochester aeronaut, lost his grip on the parachute bar when about twenty-five feet in the air, and falling a somersault, fell to the ground. Fortunately it was that his grip was loosened at the moment it was. Another second or two upward flight and a two coal-laden barges and cleared down with those and two grain-laden barges; tug Hall, up with two light barges.

It seems that trouble was experienced inflating the balloon, too big a fire having been built under it. In several places the canvas was scorched. When almost inflated there seemed danger of catching fire. It was 11 o'clock when the aeronaut with the parachute bar in his grasp shouted to those holding the ropes to let go. They quickly did so, and the balloon shot into the air. The parachute instantly opened, and the aeronaut, in the gaze of a multitude, with the aerostat swinging in a rather uncertain position. Many close by noticed that his grasp was wavering when he left the ground. He was swung in a quarter circle, and when the parachute was about twenty-five feet skyward, the bar was wrenched from his hands. There was an awful moment of suspense as the aeronaut turned a somersault and then continued tumbling horizontally to the ground. There was the instant fear that he would fall on his head and meet his death. Even in that short moment, there was fear of hundreds of minds when the position in which he would strike the ground was seen.

Allen came down forcibly on his right shoulder and side, the side of his head also colliding with the sod, which was fairly soft. He lay prostrate, while a number of men rushed to his aid. A thousand people were about the spot in a moment, and it took a number of mounted artillery men to clear a space. In a minute, Allen had recovered from his dazed condition, and was able to stand up, and step into a carriage which had been sent for by the Mayor, Joseph Shaw and Police Constable Graham. At the hospital Dr. Munnell examined him, and found him suffering from a slight concussion of the brain. No bones were broken. His right wrist was sprained and his right eye bruised.

Allen stated that he could not tell how the accident really occurred. All he knew was that the bar was wrenched from his hands, and he couldn't move himself. It is quite probable that the balloon left the ground an instant sooner than the aeronaut expected, and that he hadn't a firm enough grasp of the bar when he was lifted into the air. The jolt and swing he got were most forceful, and the motion being sideways, the danger of losing a hold was very great.

The big inflated canvas continued travelling upwards for over a hundred feet, and then, without any weight being attached, fell into a tree about seventy-five feet away over the track.

This morning, the aeronaut was all right, save for his wrists, the bones of which were slightly displaced. He expected to leave the hospital this afternoon, and get his balloon effects packed.

No doubt the celebration committee will pay him the contract fee. Allen gave an ascension, and caused about a hundred persons to be taken as high as the clouds. Formerly he had a drop, so it would seem that the contract was fulfilled.

## Land Of Few Millionaires.

Statistics recently compiled in France show that that country is a land of what political economists call "small men." This term refers, of course, to the holdings of the individual, which are more evenly divided in France than in any other civilized country. In support of this statement it is shown by statistics that France has fewer than 20,000 persons who have property valued at 1,000,000 francs (\$192,000) or more. About 11,000 of these have fortunes of from \$192,000 to \$350,000; of the remainder 6,000 only about 100 have from \$200,000 to \$10,000,000 each, while in all France there are not more than ten persons whose property is valued at \$10,000,000 or over. These figures are reliable, since they are based on current tax returns, and in France taxation is thorough and searching.
