

Land Of Few Millionaires. Statistics recently compiled France show that that country is land of what political economists call "small men." This term refers, of course, to the holdings of the individual, which are more evenly diffused in France than in any other civilized country. In support of this statement it is shown by statistics that France has fewer than 20,000 persons who have property valued at 1,000, 000 francs (\$193,000) or more. About 14,000 of these have fortunes of from 193,000 to \$380,000; of the remaining 6,000 only about 100 have from \$2,000,000 to \$10,000,000 each. in all France there are not more than ten persons whose property is valued at \$19,000,000 or over. These figures are reliable, since they are based on current tax returns, and in France taxation is therough and searching.




