HER \$1,000,000 GONE.

To Spend Days in Home She Founded.

San Francisco, Cal., May 25.—Mrs. Marie De Wolf, for fifty years a prominent worker in charitable organizations, is about to enter the home of the San Francisco Ladies' Relief and Protection Society, which she founded in 1878. At one time Mrs. De Wolf was worth \$1,000,000, and one-half of this amount she spent in doing good. The other half was stolen from the old woman by a man whom she trusted.

Mrs. De Wolf is the widow of Capt. S. I. De Wolf, commander of the ship Crescent City in 1865 with 500 people, among the victims being Gen. Wright, of the United States army, and many other prominent army officers. Incidentally the ship took down with her \$1,000,000 in specie, which was to have been used to pay Uncle Sam's soldiers.

Mrs. De Wolf is the descendant of one of the families of the revolution and until a short time ago she was an active member of the Daughters of the American Revolution.
