English Speaking Theatre Company for Mexico—Plays Produced in New York During This Season—"Hamlet" Being Played in Four London Theatres.

Bernard Shaw's "You Never Can Tell" has been successfully revived at the London Court Theatre.

During the season just closing there were produced in New York, 224 new plays and 89 revivals.

Lewis Waller and Evelyn Millard, now appearing in "Romeo and Juliet" in London, may be persuaded to tour America next season.

"Hamlet" is now being played in four London theatres. Berthold Tree, Forbes Robertson, H. B. Irving and Martin Harvey are the stars.

George Alexander's production in London, of "John Chilcote, M.P.," a novel published in America as "The Masqueraders," has failed ignominiously.

Thirteen thousand five hundred pounds have been promised for a national repertory theatre in London, and the promoters of the scheme are now hoping to amalgamate with the Shakespeare Memorial Committee.

Jacob Adler, the Hebrew character actor, appeared in a Broadway house last week in "The Merchant of Venice," playing "Shylock" with power and intensity.

The large American colony in the City of Mexico is to have an English-speaking theatrical company among its amusements next season.

Miss Beryl Hope will take a company there in the autumn and open the Renacimiento Theatre.

POPE GRANTS PRIVILEGE.

Injured Priest May Still Celebrate Mass. Special to the Whig. New York, May 27.—Information has been received here from Rome that the pope will accord to the Very Rev. Luis Martin, general of the Jesuits, the extraordinary privilege of still celebrating mass, although his right arm has been amputated.

One of the strictest rules of the Roman Catholic church is that in regard to what are designated the "canonical fingers" of the priests. These are the thumb and index finger of each hand, which alone are allowed to touch the blessed sacrament.

These are especially anointed with holy oil when the priest is ordained. As stated in the cable despatches some time ago, Father Martin, owing to a cancerous affection, had to have his whole right arm amputated.

This would ordinarily have prevented his ever celebrating mass again. When the first report of the operation and the fact that he had lost his right arm reached Rome, the pope was so affected by the news that he ordered a special dispensation to be granted to the priest, so that he should not be deprived of the consolation of his daily mass.

Another priest will have to assist him in the altar, however. Of all the cities of the world New York has had two notable instances of the ecclesiastical value set on the "canonical fingers." Father O'Reilly, the late pastor of the Church of Our Lady of Good Counsel, in East Nineteenth street, lost his life by his effort to save a canonical finger.

He injured his thumb while fishing, and blood poisoning set in. He refused to have it amputated and thus lost his right to say mass until it was "too late to save his life."

The Jesuit missionary, Father Isaac Jogues, who it is expected will now be canonized as New York's first saint, had his thumb and four fingers hacked and blown off in a barbarous manner by the Mohawk Indians. He escaped from their captivity and returned to Europe. Pope Urban VIII, hearing of his mutilated hands, sent him a particular dispensation to celebrate mass.

APPROPRIATED GOLD BAR. Got in Prison, May. Now he is Released. Special to the Whig. New York, May 27.—Accrued royalties amounting to about \$100,000 of a gold cure preparation are involved in a fight to get Joseph Haas, alias Harry Claire, out of Sing Sing prison.

Haas was convicted of burglary last year, and sentenced to Sing Sing for twenty years. The appellate court has just set aside his conviction on the ground that County Judge Humphrey should not have presided at the trial, as he was, previous to his election, the beneficiary of an accomplice.

Haas, Haas has been in Sing Sing twice in Queen's county, and his first conviction was set aside on the ground of irregularity in the trial.

Haas is an expert chemist, and his first arrest was due to his appropriation to his own use a bar of gold valued at \$3,000, given him to be used in his gold cure preparation. Ever since his arrest in Long Island City, four years ago, his lawyers have been making a hard fight to get him out of jail, so he can institute proceedings to get possession of the accrued royalties, as Haas has not received a cent since he appropriated the bar of gold. He says he took the gold because his royalties were being withheld. The prisoner is only twenty-seven years old, and for months before his capture he was hunting for him. They were employed by the manufacturers of certain medicinal preparations which Haas had imitated, and had flooded the market with his preparations.

Inspection of Dairies. Inspection of farm dairies is new legislation that has been proposed in Michigan. A score card has been suggested as a guide in inspecting the animal's quarters, dairy utensils, etc., which contains the following items: cleanliness of cows and their surroundings; utensils, attendants, and the handling of milk.

FRANCE AWAITS EAGERLY. The Approaching Visit of King Alfonso. Special to the Whig. Paris, May 27.—Because of prospect that it may have important political and commercial results, France is awaiting with eagerness the approach of King Alfonso, who according to the Spanish minister of foreign affairs and other distinguished Spanish officials, will cross the French frontier on Tuesday morning. It will be the young king's first journey beyond the confines of his own kingdom.

From the frontier until he reaches Paris King Alfonso, and his entourage will see decorations, including the entwined arms of France and Spain, which the enthusiastic French peasants have raised at all points.

On arriving in Paris his majesty will be received at the railway station by President and Mme. Loubet, the presidents of the senate and chamber of the republic, and other high officials of the republic. French soldiers in their striking uniforms will surround the station and stretch in long lines along the flag-bedecked Bois de Boulogne, through the Arc de Triomphe, and Champs de Elysee to the Place de la Concorde, where a battery will add its thunder to the official welcome.
