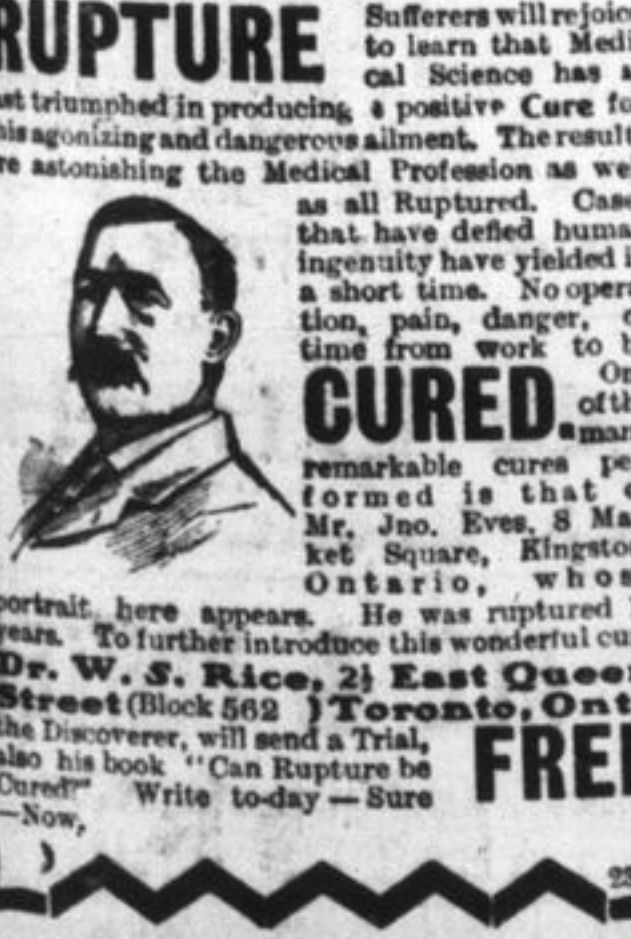

New York, May 27. William K. Vanderbilt, Jr., is to be representative of the New York Central railroad in the management of the trolley concerns of which the big system has acquired control in the Mohawk Valley. NEWS OF CHURCHES

THE VARIOUS DOINGS IN THE RELIGIOUS WORLD.

Items That Will Interest the Church-going Public Gleaned from Many Fields.

Rev. H. J. Leake, M.A., has been appointed to take charge of St. Philip's church, Hamilton. The Bishop of Huron has appointed Rev. Canon Downie, Watford, to be rector of Port Stanley. Rev. William R. Harvey, Point St. Charles Congregational church, has accepted a call to Rock Island. At the Brazil National Christian Endeavor convention, sixty-two societies, with two thousand members, were reported.

The Bishop of Huron has appointed Rev. E. G. Dymond, Stayner, son of the late Principal Dymond, incumbent of the parish of Glenora. A great conference of Baptists from every quarter of the world representing 5,700,000 communicants, will be held in London in July next. Roman Catholic Anglican bishops in Victoria, Australia, are protesting against the extravagance of costly funerals.



REV. ANNA H. SHAW. President of the American National Woman's Suffrage Association, will meet in annual convention in Portland, Ore., on June 29th. The First Methodist church, London, has invited Rev. Dr. Hannon, of Exeter, to take charge of the Richmond street and Kensington missions. The London Congregational Union had \$75,000 to use in its work last year. It will soon open a third central mission in South London. Rev. S. W. Phelps, Ph.D., Ovid, Mich., has been called to West Bay City, Dr. Phelps is a graduate of Woodstock College and Toronto University.

Rev. Clement Williams has been appointed by the Bishop of Qu'Appelle to appeal for funds on behalf of the cathedral to the late Archbishop Machray. There are 410 families in connection with the Smith's Falls Methodist church. The membership is 697, showing an increase of thirty-seven over last year. The emperor of Japan has given the Y.M.C.A. \$5,000 from his private purse in recognition of the great service rendered by it to the army in Manchuria.

Rev. P. A. Cassidy, M.A., formerly of Guelph, has severed his connection with the Canadian Methodist church to become presiding elder of the M.E. church in Japan. Rev. D. O. Crossley has accepted the invitation of the official board of Whitby Methodist church to become their pastor at the close of the present conference year. A recent communication from Rev. W. M. Young, of Kentville, Nova Scotia, reports that he has baptized seven hundred and twelve since the movement among the Mushos began.

Rev. J. J. Rae, First Methodist church, Picton, asked his congregation for a thank offering of \$1,000 at the close of the evening service \$1,020.81 had been contributed. There is a steadily increasing number of congregations in the Presbyterian church that maintain a foreign missionary. The number of such congregations is about thirty-five. Rev. Charles P. MacGregor, for nearly five years pastor of the Bergen Point church, Bayonne, N.J., has been engaged as assistant pastor of St. R. S. MacArthur, of the Calvary church, New York.

Rev. P. C. Parker, M.A., formerly of First avenue, Toronto, spending the winter in Winnipeg, has accepted the call extended to him by the Logan avenue church of that place to become their pastor. St. Paul's Presbyterian church, Hamilton has notified Dr. R. P. McKay, secretary for foreign missions, that it will undertake the support of J. G. Ferguson, B.A., M.D., who will go to Formosa next fall.

The Universalist Japanese mission is nearly fifteen years old. It has thirty-six churches organized. Over \$100,000 has been given to its work since it was organized, and an effort to raise \$15,000 for it is now being made. A Japanese officer not a Christian, observing the noble bearing of Christian Japanese soldiers, wrote to an English missionary: "I think it would be a good thing for the army if all became Christians."

Rev. G. W. Henderson, pastor of the Cambridge Street Methodist church, Lindsay, has received an invitation to the pastorate of the Methodist church, Regina, but in view of having accepted an invitation to Port Hope, he could not entertain it. Plans for outdoor preaching, and tent work for the coming summer in Chicago are being made on a large scale. It will cost about \$400 a month to support the work in a single tent, aside from the cost of the tent.

A few Christian men in one of the suburbs of Melbourne, Australia, raised a sum of money to be expended in paving for the publication of religious intelligence in the two great Melbourne dailies on certain days of the week. Rev. John McNeill, Scottish evangelist, at the invitation of Christians of various sects, is conducting revival meetings in Constantinople. Interpreters make the message of Mr. McNeill known to his Turkish, Armenian and other hearers. The oldest Presbyterian mission in China is at Ningpo. It was started in 1855, and is exerting a great influence throughout the country. In China fifty years ago there were only 300 members in the Protestant church. To-day there are 100,000 members. The Tabernacle Chapel, Penarth, Wales, has now entered upon its nineteenth week during which revival meetings have been held every evening. The number of converts is over six hundred, and eighty-seven of them have been baptized by the pastor. Open-air meetings are also still held.

DIVORCE IS ASKED.

Husband Gives Wife Thirty Black Eyes. London, May 27.—Alleging cruelty as one of the grounds upon which her marriage should be dissolved, Mrs. Ann Cross asked in the divorce court, that her husband, who in 1901 took a public house at Kilburn, had given her more than thirty black eyes. When she complained about him playing billiards with the barmaid he tore her hair out of her head and threw it on the fire. The judge postponed the granting of the decree, as there was an error in the marriage certificate, but said that he was satisfied as to the cruelty and misconduct.

STABLE RULES.

Suggestions as to How to Obtain Best Results. The milk of any animal suffering from disease should not be used for food in any form. The milk from fresh animals should be rejected until after the ninth milking. Ensilage, turnips, etc., should only be fed immediately after the milking, so as to allow time for the elimination of the volatile products of these feeds from the system of the animal. The quantity of above feeds should be limited, so that the animals will consume the entire ration at once. The milking stable should be as free from dust as possible at time of milking. Feed dry ladders after milk is removed from stable. Brush udder and flanks with a stiff brush to remove dirt and loose hairs. Squeeze off udder thoroughly with clean water, leaving it moist but not dripping wet. Use only clean tin milk-pails. Reject all rusty or patched tinware in the milk business. Unless seams and joints are extra well soldered, it is best to have an extra coating over all seams and the joints well flushed. Just before milking the milker should wash his hands thoroughly with soap and water. Under no condition should the hands be wet during the milking. Milk should not be left in the barn during the milking, as it can absorb odors even when hot and become contaminated with bacteria from the

Milk, even when warm, should be strained through several layers of clean cloth. This strainer should be first washed in tepid water and then after every milking and then dried. Milk should be aerated immediately after being milked. Milk should be immediately cooled after being drawn from the cow. Where possible use ice or cold running water. A quick reduction in temperature checks the development of any bacteria that may have fallen into the milk during milking.
