TO ABOLISH METERS

AND GIVE HOTELS FIXED WATER RATES.

Special Account Fixed for Each Hotel—Leap at the Locomotive Works—Trouble Over the Passing of Two Accounts.

The water works' committee meeting yesterday afternoon, the chief question dealt with was the request of the hotel proprietors for the abolition of meters on their premises.

Ald. Mowat claimed that the hotel men should be treated with more consideration. They should not be charged by meter if restaurants and boarding houses were not. Some hotelmen kept water running troughs were used for the benefit of the public, and yet they were charged with the water, which went through the meter. That was decidedly unfair.

Chairman Sands said that the meter men were to show where the waste was. However, he thought that the hotels should receive more consideration. Some of them were paying too much.

In motion of Ald. Mowat, it was decided to recommend to the council that meters on hotel premises be withdrawn and that fixed rates be charged. These rates are designated in a schedule submitted, an amount for every hotel being fixed. The amounts were arrived at by a comparison with the former fixed rates and those charged by meter. For instance, one hotel has paid \$12 a quarter by meter; hereafter it will pay \$10.40. Before the meters were put on, the total water rates paid in a year by the hotels amounted to \$667.40. By meter during the past year the total was \$1,237. Under the new system proposed, the total will be \$1,040, or \$197 less than by meter. \$332 more than under the former fixed rate system. The new plan will no doubt be satisfactory all round.

The chairman announced that he had received a letter from the Whaley Automatic Smoke Preventer and Fuel Saver company, of Toronto, stating that their representative would be in Kingston in a few days and would consult the chairman regarding putting on the water works' pump house for trial.

Regarding the leak in the water works' system at the Locomotive Works, Superintendent Hewitt stated that the leakage had decreased from twenty-seven gallons to nine gallons a minute. The only way of getting at the cause was to examine the pipes and mains on the Locomotive Works premises. The chairman said that Mr. Jennings offered to pay for the excavations if a leak was found within the premises. If there was not then let the city pay the cost. Ald. Harkness and McKay thought this was a fair offer. Ald. Mowat remarked that if the leak continued to decrease in the same proportion as it has done, the committee need not bother about it.

An application was received from the School of Mining asking that a meter be placed on the water works' office of the geological building. The committee decided that the rate fixed last year for the building was quite low, and that there was no good reason for putting on a meter. Accordingly, no action was taken on the application.

Report was made that the finance committee had refused to pass the accounts of Hunter & Farid and J. Milo, amounting in all to \$106, for work done in repairing the water works' pump house windows and doors, damaged by the steamer Scout explosion, because tenders had not been called for. The chairman authorized the work as one of great emergency. Repairs had to be made immediately so that the work of the department could proceed with safety. The committee reviewed the accounts, and the city council will be asked to authorize their payment on account of the circumstances being exceptional.

All members of the committee were present, viz., Alds. Sand (chairman), Mowat, Abbott, Johnston, McKay, Givens and Harkness.

REV. D. N. MORDEN

The examination and classification of cheese at Montreal, and it is satisfactory to note that steps have been taken to put it on an improved basis. The matter was recently considered at a conference held in Montreal, between representatives of the trade and J. A. Riddick, dairy commissioner of the province in the country, and the dairy interest in the country were also consulted.

As will be noted the new regulations contain important features. Heretofore classification has consisted of practically only two grades, "finest" and "under finest." The new classification provides for three grades, the first grade is with some slight modification equivalent to "finest" quality under the old classification. An important provision is that weights shall be stencilled or marked with a rubber stamp on cheese boxes which is practically a new requirement in the standard for the highest grade, although it has been adopted by a majority of factories.

First Grade. Flavor—Clean, sound and pure. Body and texture—Close, firm and silky. Color—Good and uniform. Finish—Fairly even in size, smoothly finished, sound and clean surfaces, straight and square.

Second Grade. Flavor—"Fruity," not clean, "tired," or other objectionable flavor. Body and texture—Weak, open, loose, "acid," too soft, too dry. Color—Uneven, mottled, or objectionable shade.

Third Grade. Flavor—Rancid, badly "off," any flavor inferior to second grade. Body and texture—Very weak, very open, showing pin holes or pores, very "acid," very soft or very dry. Color—Badly mottled, or very objectionable shade.
