The expression "good color" means that the color must be of a proper shade. There are cheap, inferior cheese colors used which do not give proper shade no matter what quality is used. The expression "clean surfaces" in the definition for first grade does not exclude from that grade cheese with slight growth of blue mould. though it is desirable that the cheese should not show any signs of mould "Black mould," (see definition for second grade), is simply the advanced stage of ordinary blue mould,

The following scale of points will indicate the relative values of the different divisions of quality. Flavor 40, body and texture 30, color 15, finsh and boxing 15-total 100. It is obvious that a defect in flavor of a certain degree counts nearly three times as much in determining the grade as a defect in finish or boxing

of the same degree. Cheese which are strictly sour, are otherwise inferior to Third Grade, will be designated as "culls," for which there is no classification. Any lot of cheese shall be considered Third Grade, if it shows three or

more defects of Second Grade. If there are not more than fifteen per cent, of defective cheese in any lot, the inferior ones may be sorter rel to-day.
