

The official welcome to King Alfonso began at Cherbourg upon the arrival of the Spanish squadron there. The notable ceremonies were deferred until the arrival in Paris. During the morning the capital completed its preparations to welcome the young ruler. The final touches were placed on the decorations, the troops marched to their positions along the route' over which the royal visitor was to drive, and crowds assembled near the station upon sidewalks of the Avenue du Bois de Boulogne, and in the

Champs de Elyseès. The band of the Republican Guard was with the official reception party at the station. The station was magnificently decorated with red velvet. There was a canopy over the entrance, and the salon was ornamented with magnificent draperies, flowers and

On the arrival of the royal train, King Alfonso, in the uniform of -a general of the Spanish army, descended, his suite following, M. Loubet and the ministers of state cordially greeted the royal visitor, the band playing the Spanish national anthem, and the guard of honor presenting arms. The party then walked to the salon, where M. Loubet presented the dignitaries of state to his majesty. The president and king afterward entered a state carriage drawn by four horses with outriders, and escorted by a detachment of troops. The appearance of the young king was the signal for enthusiastic applause from the multitude as sembled about the station. After short time spent at the d'Orsav Palace, Kino Alfonso drove to the Elysee to pay his respects to M. Loubet.

The Canadian North-West. HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-W Territories, excepting 8 and 26, which has not been homesteaded, or reserved provide wood lots for settlers, or for other purposes, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of afamily, or any male over 18 years of age to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the Local Agent for the District in which the land is situated, receive authority for some one to make entry for him. A fee of \$10

charged for a homestead entry. HOMESTEAD DUTIES A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required by the provisions of the Dominion Lands Act, and the amendments thereto, to perform the conditions connected therewith, unde one of the following plans : (1) At lease six months' residence upo and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years. It is the practice of the Department to require a settler to bring 15 acres under cultivation, but if he prefers he may substitute stock; and 20 head of cattle, to be actually his own property, with buildings for heir accommodation, will be accepted instead of the cultivation. (2) If the father (or mother, if the fa her is deceased), of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry unde the provisions of this act, resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entere for by such person as a homestead, the

requirements of this act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If a settler was entitled to and has obtained entry for a second homestead the requirements of this act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may satisfied by residence upon the first homestead, if the second homestead is in vicinity of the first homestead. (4) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by his in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this act as to residence make satisfied by residence upon the saidland. The term "vicinity" used above meant to indicate the same township, or an adjoining of cornering township, settler whe avails himself of the provisions of Clauses (2), (3) or (4) must call tivate 30 acres of his homestead, or substitute 20 head of stock, with building for their accommodation, and have besides 80 acres substantially fenced. The provisions of the pro vilege of a second entry is restricted by law to those settlers only who completes the duties upon their first homsteads to entitle them to patent on or before the 2nd June, 1889. Every homesteader who falls to comply with the requirements of the homsetead law is liable to have his entry cancelled, and the land may be

again thrown open for entry. APPLICATION FOR PATENT Should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent at the Homestead Inspector. Before making application for patent, the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the commissioner of Dominion Lands at

INFORMATION Newly arrived immigrants will receive at the Immigration Office in Winnipag or at any Dominion Lands Office in Manitoba or the North-West Territories, information as to the lands that are open for entry, and from the officers in charge free of expenses, advice and assistance in securing lands to suit them. Full information respecting the land, timber, coal and mineral laws, as well as respecting Dominion Lands in the Railway Beit in British Columbia, may be obtained upon application to the Secretary of the Pepartment of the Interior, Ottawa; the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, Manitoba; or to any of the Dominion Lands Agents in Manitoba or the North-West Territories.
