If there is any lesson in his life is the unprofitableness of politics. Mr. McDougall gave his best years and best-mind to the service of the people, and he got scant satisfaction and reward. Had he put the same vigour and attention into law he would have been a richer and a happier man.

Had the fourth Baltic squadron under Nebogatoff joined Rojestvensky this preponderance, it has been remarked, would have been real. The Russians had seven battleships, two armoured eruisers, and six protected cruisers. Togo had five battleships, eight arm oured cruisers, and thirteen protected cruisers, besides a large number of destroyers and torpedo boats. 
