The chances of the Americans securing the ladies' golf championship at Cromer, Eng., has disappeared.

The M.C.C. eleven to visit America will be under the captaincy of E. W. Mann, who is captain of Cambridge University.

Manager Dunn, of Providence, is spoken of as a likely candidate for manager of the Boston National League team next year.

Pitcher Yerkes of Buffalo will be out of the game for some time. He broke a finger on his pitching hand stopping a liner on the holiday.

The Argonauts' eight, of Toronto, will row Syracuse University, the inter-college champions, at Lake Ontario, Syracuse, Saturday week.

**MIKE SCHRACK.**

The hard-hitting Cincinnati middleweight, who is to fight Bob Fitzsimmons, Schrack has been in the pugilistic line-light for several years and has made a good record for himself, though the experts are inclined to doubt ability to trot in the same class as Fitz.

"Knotty" Lee's Brantford team was defeated at St. Thomas, 4-3. The game was exceedingly fast. The visitors led up to the ninth, when with two men on bases, Pete McDonald drove a clean home run.

Nearly one-half of the 2911 clubs in England are golf clubs. Of the 250 social clubs in London, twenty-six are for women alone, and six others admit women. The largest women's club has 3,700 members.

At Providence in the eighth innings of the Tuesday morning game the crowd objected to one of Empire Egan's close decisions, and mobbed him. Efficient work of the police saved Egan from injury and the game was resumed.

With three on bases in the first-innings of the Tuesday morning game at Buffalo, Third-baseman Aubrey of Montreal "struck de ball" to the bleachers, and everybody scored. The Bisons did not score any more, and Montreal won by 4 to 3.

The Galt senior football team, champions of Ontario, Manitoba and the North West, and the Olympic games at St. Louis, leave on Monday for Montreal, where they are to play the Westmonts, champions of Quebec.

The June meeting of the Quebec Rugby Football Union promises to be very lively. St. Patrick's Society, of Ottawa, and the Shamrocks, of Montreal, are pulling the wires to secure admission. It is not likely that both will be admitted.

The two Canada's cup challengers being built by Capt. James Andrews at Oakville will be in the water in a few days. The Wellington will have two sets of sails—the one made by Ratsey, of England, and the other by O'Brien, of Kingston.

Danny Maher, at Epsom, followed up his Derby victory on Lord Rosbery's (Geary) by landing another good race, the Great Surrey foal stakes (of 1,000 sovereigns; five furlongs) on Anniversary II. He also captured the Ridesidlow plate with Zemon.

John White, the elongated Cornwall Island Indian, who became famous on the Cornwall Lacrosse team, and played with Port Hope in 1903, and Brantford in 1904, will leave on Friday morning to join the "Toughs," in whose team he will lodge this summer.

At a meeting of the directors of the National League, John J. McGraw, manager of the New York Baseball Club, was exonerated of the charges brought against him by President Barney Dreyfuss, of the Pittsburgh Club, and the board expressed its disapproval of Dreyfuss' action in indulging in the controversy with McGraw.

President Seitz gave Manager Harley orders after the game at Rochester to give Toronto a good team, whatever the cost, and if the present four games at Jersey City do not show winning ball, there will in all probability be some new faces on the nine when they return home. **SUNLESS WEATHER.**

Hick's Predictions for Hymen's Favorite Month.

Divested of astronomical technicalities, Rev. I. R. Hick's weather predictions for June seem to indicate that there will be a number of June brides on whom the sun will not shine. There seems to be little promise of fair weather for any length of time at any time during June. From the 3rd until the 5th, from the 7th to the 12th, and the 14th to the 15th, show pretty continuous unsettled weather. The latter date, says the prophet, is a time when hay-makers will be under constraint in harvesting their crops, and grain that will stand without material loss until the June solstice showers subside, will be sorer uncut, unless small quantities are reaped at a time and handled with great promptness and care. The barometer usually under and follows, and will play no small part in the important work of harvesting during this month. From the 20th to the 24th brings very high temperature, low barometer and threatening storms. Electrical unrest will continue from 26th to 28th. There is the greatest danger in taking shelter under green trees during these June thunder storms. We repeat, also, the warning of danger to live stock from lightning in crowded barns and sheds, and from exposure to wire fences. Every season we hear of much stock being killed by lightning, in consequence of flocks and herds huddling under trees and against wire fences in thunder storms. Such suggestions may seem unimportant to some, but correct statistics of loss and death by lightning, especially in the month of June, would not a different meaning into the proposition.

A marked shortage of rainfall will be felt over most of the great central, western, northwestern and southwestern grain belts, before the crops of the present season are matured.

**FOR THE FARMER.**

Useful Hints That Are Money Savers.

Reports have been coming in of danger to tomato and other vegetable crops from the Niagara peninsula. In some places in the district the frost was very heavy and considerable damage was done to early tomato plants. One grower reported he had nearly fifteen hundred young plants. Even in the hot-house some of the tomato plants which were near glass were killed by frost. The fruit it is believed was not damaged.

Some Kingston township gardeners are regretting their cover harts in the matter of early planting. One in particular lost several thousand celery plants, while others had tomato plants nipped by late visits of frost.

The young colts should be kept growing all the time. There is nothing better for promoting growth than cow's milk, skimmed. Most colts can be taught to drink milk without much trouble, especially if they have learned to eat bran mash while running with their dams. A spoonful of ground flaxseed added to each quart ration tends to keep the bowels in condition and gives a rich gloss to the coat. It is also a good idea to teach the foal to eat apples, potatoes and carrots.

No farmer can afford to let any of the best manure go to waste, as its fertilizing properties are of the very best. Sheep manure will continue to enrich the ground and show in the crops for a dozen years. Sheep manure is even the price of a building to preserve it.

Heavy spring ploughing is hard on the points of shoulders both in mules and horses. Next to a well fitted collar, salt water and borax wash are the best remedies to touch the tender skin and save this pain and trouble. It is a good practice to send horses to the harness maker, where each can be accurately fitted in the spring with a new collar if needed. It pays to fit the collar to the individual. There are thin necks and thick necks to fit, and the same style or filling will not suit all—to say nothing of measurements from top to bottom. Do not make the serious mistake of taking up or letting out home strings to force a bad collar to fit. It won't do it.

Rural New Yorker says that in some sections of the United States the system of hiring help by the month or year has been entirely done away with. It is now a matter for the farmer and his family to do as much of the work they can themselves and trust to day labor to help out in a pinch.

Australian butter makers have secured a freight rate on butter ships of a penny a pound instead of three-quarters as at present. Distance amounts for little in competition when there is a possibility of carriage by water.

It is reported that 50,000 apple trees were destroyed by rabbits in the Hudson Valley last winter. There is danger of an increase in the damages owing to the fact that sportsmen are said to have formed a fund to buy up and liberate a lot of rabbits in the district so that they may later on have the pleasure of hunting and killing them. It is not surprising that farmers object to this scheme. Unless Hudson Valley may suffer on a small scale the evil that nearly ruined Australia.

Thirty pigs are usually ready for weaning at seven weeks old, and in order that their growth may not be well to teach them to eat it a little before they are ready to be weaned. This can best be done by pouring a little milk, sweetened, if necessary, into a shallow trough out of the sow's reach, and if one of the pigs can be induced to drink a little of the milk the others will soon follow. After they can drink readily from the trough some shorts can be added to the milk and the mixture gradually thickened until they will eat readily. A few days before they are weaned they may be given a little corn soaked about twenty-four hours.

**HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS**

Any area numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Territories, excepting 3 and 24, which has not been homesteaded, or reserved to provide wood lots for settlers, or for other purposes, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is a Canadian citizen, or any person over 18 years of age to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

**ENTRY**

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the Local Agent for the District in which the land is situated, receive authority for some one to make entry for him. A fee of \$10 is charged for a homestead entry.

**HOMESTEAD DUTIES**

A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required by the provisions of the Dominion Lands Act, and the amendments thereto, to perform the following duties:—

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years. It is the practice of the Department to require a settler to bring 15 acres under cultivation, but if he prefers he may substitute stock; and 20 head of cattle, to be actually his own property, with buildings for a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of this act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(2) If the settler was entitled to and has obtained entry for a second homestead the requirements of this act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by residence upon the first homestead, if the second homestead is in the vicinity of the first homestead.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farmland owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. The term "vicinity" used above is meant to indicate the same township, or an adjoining or cornering township. A settler who avails himself of the provisions of Clause (2) (3) or (4) must cultivate 30 acres of his homestead, or substitute 20 head of stock, with buildings for their accommodation, and have besides 30 acres substantially fenced. The privilege of a second entry is restricted by law to those settlers only who completed the duties upon their first homestead, and that to settlers who entered the same land in 1889. Every homesteader who fails to comply with the requirements of the homestead law is liable to have his entry cancelled, and the land may be again thrown open for entry.

**APPLICATION FOR PATENT**

Should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector, before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of his intention to do so.

**INFORMATION**

Newly arrived immigrants will receive at the Immigration Office in Winnipeg, or at any Dominion Lands Office in Manitoba or the North-West Territories, information as to the lands that are open for entry, and from the officers in charge free of expense, advice and assistance in securing lands to suit them. Full information respecting the land, timber, coal and mineral laws, as well as respecting Dominion Lands in the Railway Belt in British Columbia, may be obtained upon application to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa; the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, Manitoba; or to any of the Dominion Lands Agents in Manitoba or the North-West Territories.
