with a severe accident early on Saturday evening. She was coming down Queen street on a bicycle, and approaching the corner of Montreal street from Bay street was Daniel Eves on his cab. As soon as the latter saw the cyclist, he pulled in his horses just as they stepped over the crossing. and the danger was over had the young lady continued on her course. in front of the horses, which were standing still. She became confused. however, and uttering a scream, turned her wheel directly at the cab. The action was so unexpected that Mr. The Eves could do really nothing to get out of the way, but turned his horses to one side, so that if the cyclist was out of danger from the horses' hind feet. The bicycle struck the end of the cab pole, and Miss Hepburn was thrown violently to the ground, where she lay prostrate. At first it was thought she was dead. Mr. Eves and George Darragh carried her into the latter's house, and the former started out for a doctor. He drove to a dozen places before he secured one. It was fifteen minutes before Miss Hepburn revived. Dr. Wood found that she was not seriously injured. No bones were broken, and the only wound, besides a few bruises, was a cut in the forehead. 
