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STATE TERMS

Russia Wants To Hear From Japan. PRESIDENT IS BUSY. THE SITUATION IS EXTREMELY DELICATE.

The Rumors Seem to be of the Spread-Eagle Character for London and Paris Have Nothing Confirmatory, But on the Other Hand That the War is To Go on.

Special to the Whig. St. Petersburg, June 8.—As a result of the meeting of the council of ministers, held at Tsarkoe-Selo, on Saturday, instructions were telegraphed yesterday afternoon, to the Russian ambassadors, at Washington and Paris, to the effect that Russia is desirous of hearing Japan's peace conditions.

REAL RAFFLES

He is Now En Route to This Continent. POSED FOR HONORS. SAID HE WAS BOTH DUKE AND PRINCE.

But All the Time He Was Engaged in Wholesale Burglary—He Will Try to Reform—A Person Interested in Him Will Come Along.

Berlin, June 8.—A Raffles in real life has just published his memoirs, which are of special interest because they announce his intention to reform, and to start a new life in America, to which country he will be accompanied by a person who has undertaken the work of his reform.

Manila, June 8.—Rear Admiral Enquist received at one o'clock, this morning, the following cable-despatch from St. Petersburg: "Remain at Manila at the disposition of the American government. Effect repairs as much as possible."

Vienna, June 8.—It is learned here to-night that the Russian government has informed its diplomatic representatives abroad, including Count Cassini, the ambassador at Washington, that the time for Russia to conclude peace has not yet come, and that when it does arrive Russia will open peace negotiations with Japan, independent of foreign intervention.

Mob Threatened to Lynch Robbers of Washerwoman. New York, June 8.—An angry mob of 500 persons pursued and overtook two youths who had knocked down and robbed an old washerwoman in the Williamsburg section of Brooklyn, set them with stones and decayed fruit, dragged them to a lamp post and was apparently preparing to hang them with a clothes line when the police interfered.

Occupants Raced Out in Swimming Costumes. Montreal, June 8.—The splendid building of the Y.M.C.A., on Dominion Square, was evacuated on Saturday night by a narrow escape from obliteration by fire, this morning, and it was, damage done to extent of \$15,000 before the firemen got through with their work.

To Have Larger Powers. Special to the Whig. An extension of the principle of responsible government, to the Yukon, by means of an elective council, together with important modifications in the regulations governing the territory, was foreshadowed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in the commons, yesterday.

NORWAY STRIKES BLOW.

Time of Revolution Favorable to Success. London, June 8.—Had Russia not been involved in a difficult war in the far east, it is doubtful whether Norway would have undertaken the present revolution.

It is nowhere thought that King Oscar will consent to a junior member of his family becoming king of Norway. This proposal is regarded as an attempt to palliate the blow to the deposed king, and the opinion of English newspapers is that the suggestion is impracticable.

British sympathies appear to be strongly on the side of Sweden, and King Oscar, more especially as an English princess is about to marry a prince who is in direct line of succession to the Swedish throne.

Water town, N.Y., June 5.—The little village of Belleville, about fifteen miles southwest of this city, is much excited over the dropping of Principal Currier from the school faculty and the attending incidents.

Deputy Sheriff Slay's Man in Seizing Crowd. Saginaw, Mich., June 8.—The first bloodshed in connection with the street railway strike, which began in Saginaw Valley, Sunday morning, occurred yesterday. Deputy Sheriff Fred Harris shot and killed Henry Wick, Jr., a Fore Marquette machinist, and wounded Terence Kelly and Wallace A. Douglas.

To Name Two Men. To Fill Offices Held by Mr. Rowell. Special to the Whig. Toronto, June 8.—The provincial government, shortly, will make two appointments to the Consolidated Lake Superior company, one the government director on the board, and the second, that of government agent in connection with the Consolidated companies.

Explosions on a Submarine. Special to the Whig. Toronto, June 8.—While the submarine A. S. was manoeuvring off port, to-day, three explosions occurred and the boat sank. Eighteen men were aboard the vessel, of whom only four escaped. The other fourteen were drowned. Divers are now at work on the sunken vessel.

To Construct Water Tunnel. Toronto, June 8.—The board of control awarded to Mr. J. Haney, the Montreal and Toronto contractor, the contract for the construction of the proposed water tunnel under the bay, to take the place of the present conduit. Mr. Haney's tender was \$269,000, the lowest among the five received.

Was Accidental. Special to the Whig. Marmora, Ont., June 8.—An inquest was held here, yesterday, on the body of Charles Franklin, who was drowned April 13th last. The jury, after a full investigation, came to the conclusion that Franklin's drowning was purely accidental.

Bishop's College Call. Sherbrooke, Que., June 8.—Rev. T. B. Watt, rector of St. Jude, Bristol, England, has accepted the principalship of Bishop's College, Lennoxville. He will arrive in Canada about the 1st of September.
