

## Russia Wants To Hear From Japan.

## PRESIDENT IS BUSY

## THE SITUATION IS EXTREME- LY DELICATE.

The Rumors seem to be of the Spread-Eagle character for London and Paris having nothing to do with the Other Hand That the War is to Go on.

St. Petersburg, June 8.—As a result of the meeting of the council of ministers, held at Tsarko-Selo, on Saturday, instructions were telegraphed yesterday afternoon, to the Russian ambassador, at Washington, and Paris, to the effect that Russia is desirous of learning Japan's peace conditions, and that the Japanese efforts to bring the "bulldozers" together entered on a distinctly new phase on Tuesday night. Foreign Minister Lamadoff had an audience with the emperor in the afternoon upon the subject of Ambassador Cassini's communication, and at eleven o'clock, that night, United States Ambassador Meyer called upon Count Lamadoff, at the chancellor, and remained with the foreign minister for some time.

Russia Ships Are Interned.

New York, June 8.—That the Japs intend to carry on military operations in Manchuria on an extensive scale is illustrated by their placing large contracts for various railroad equipment in this market. Hundreds of cars, locomotives, etc., are to be rushed to the far east with all possible dispatch. All the shipments will go overland to the Pacific coast. Forty thousand tons of freight have already been booked with the transcontinental roads, which will mean an expenditure of upward of \$700,000 for this alone.

An eastern car company has just obtained a contract from the Japanese government for 1,800 steel cars, varying in capacity from seven to twenty tons. Another contract, which was placed last week, calls for 1,000 gondola type, steel underframe cars.

A further contract has also been awarded by the Japanese government to the Baldwin Locomotive Works, which concern recently was allotted one for 120 locomotives through the same source. One hundred additional locomotives have been ordered by a person who has undertaken the work of his reformation.

Will Act Independently.

Vienna, June 8.—It is learned here to-night that the Russian government has informed its diplomatic representatives abroad, including Count Cassini, the ambassador at Washington, that the time for Russia to conclude peace has not yet come, and that when it does arrive Russia will open peace negotiations with Japan, independently of foreign intervention.

SAVED THEIR NECKS.

Mob Threatened to Lynch Robbers of Washerwoman.

New York, June 8.—An angry mob of 500 persons pursued and overtaken two youths who had knocked down and robbed an old washerwoman in the Williamson section of Brooklyn, together with a woman and decayed fruit, dragged them to a lamp post and was apparently preparing to hang them with a clothes line when the police interfered. The young men were John Becker and Bernard Walk, each aged nineteen years.

Annie Sherhardt, aged seventy-two years, was carrying a big basket of laundry through the street, when the boys stopped her, and one snatched her purse from her hand while the other knocked her down with a blow of his fist. The boys then fled, but Mrs. Sherhardt's screams attracted a crowd which overtook the boys. One person in the crowd called out that they deserved to be lynched. The crowd took up the cry, secured a rope and had just reached a lamp post when police officers arrived.

HAD NARROW SHAVE.

Occupants Raced Out in Swimming Costumes.

Montreal, June 8.—The splendid building of the Y.M.C.A., on Dominion Square, facing the Windsor hotel, had a narrow escape from obliteration by fire, this morning, and, as it was, damage done to extent of \$15,000 before the firemen got through with their work. Fire started in an unused dumb-waiter in the lower part of the building, near the gymnasium, and that part was the most damaged. Some of the upper floors of the building were saved, however, and there were some narrow escapes, as the whole building was quickly filled with suffocating smoke. Some of the occupants had gone to the swimming pool in the basement for a morning plunge and had to make their escape to Dominion Square with little or no clothing.

To Have Larger Powers.

Ottawa, June 8.—An extension of the principle of responsible government to the Yukon, by means of an elected council, together with important modifications in the regulations governing the territory, was foreseen by Sir Charles Hardinge, the British ambassador. The present situation is extremely delicate and the greatest reticence is observed.

Nothing Heard Of It.

Paris, June 8.—The Temps' St. Petersburg correspondent says that as a result of the conference, at Tsarko-Selo, the partisans of peace are considerably disconcerted. A war to the bitter end is foreseen. The British and American ambassadors deny that they have been charged to take any steps towards opening negotiations for peace.

Is Not Supported.

London, June 8.—The statement from St. Petersburg that the Tsar's partisans of peace are not supported from any source in Paris or elsewhere in Europe. On the contrary Russia's determination to continue fighting at arm's length is reasserted, coupled with a report that the whole western frontier of Russia will be demurred to reinforce Gen. Lvitch.

The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times says there is considerable speculation over the mysterious visit of Mr. Meyer, the American ambassador, to Tsarko-Selo, yesterday afternoon. The stories of American intervention are revived, although according to the correspondent, no foundation for them is thus far apparent. Suspicion of Germany is growing. The Russ publishes a remarkable article, showing that Germany lamented and continues to encourage the war with the sole aim of weakening Russia, thus acquiring a free hand to settle the destinies of Austria-Hungary and the Balkans.

REAL RAFFLES

Time of Revolution Favorable to Success.

London, June 8.—Had Russia not been involved in a difficult war in the far east, it is doubtful whether Norway would have undertaken the present revolution.

It is nowhere thought that King Oscar will consent to a junior member of his family becoming king of Norway. This proposal is regarded as an attempt to palliate the blow to the deposed king, and the opinion of English newspapers is that the suggestion is impracticable.

The consular difficulty is supposed to be only an outward manifestation of the deep-seated separatist aspirations of the majority of Norwegians.

It is pointed out that the constitution makes express provision for the overruling of the royal veto in cases where it can be proved by three separately elected Storthings to be in antagonism to the national will.

Therefore it cannot be assumed that the king yielded his powers.

British sympathies appear to be strongly on the side of Sweden and King Oscar, more especially as an English princess is about to marry a prince who is in direct line of succession to the Swedish throne.
