



Beef cattle still continue scarce this district, and prices of beef are accordingly high. By the carcase, grass beef brought \$5 to \$7 per cwt., and western beef, 87 to 89, with a scarcity of both, Mutton brought 87 to 89 per cwt, by the carcase, and 8c, to 9c. by the quarter.
