SATURDAY'S MARKET PRICES.

Beef Scarce-Plenty of Green Garden Stuff on Sale. On the local market to-day, prices remained fairly firm at the figures given last week. The number of sellers present was smaller than last Saturday, but the supply of most staple articles was entirely sufficient for the demand. Beef cattle still continue scarce in this district, and prices of beef are accordingly high. By the carcass, grass beef brought \$5 to \$7 per cwt., and western beef, \$7 to \$9, with a second cut of both. Mutton brought \$7 to \$9 per cwt. by the carcass, and \$8 to \$9 by the quarter. Veal by the quarter was fairly plentiful at from 5c to 8c per lb. Pork was scarce; \$6.40 per cwt. alive for delivery next week, and from \$7 to \$8.50 per cwt. by the carcass, being the ruling figures. Lamb was quoted at from \$3 to \$5 by the carcass, and \$1 to \$1.50 by the quarter, the supply being small and the demand active. On the whole, the market remained firm at last week's prices, 90c a bag. The supply of greens and vegetables gave evidence of the increasing growth and several exceptionally fine displays of market garden produce were shown. Last week's prices prevailed here, although vegetables in bunches showed slight increases in size of the bunches. Lettuce, radishes, etc., brought 5c or 3 for 10c. Potatoes were plentiful at 75c per bag, seed potatoes being offered at from 60c to 70c per bag. New potatoes are not yet in evidence and many growers report damage to potato crops as a result of recent heavy rains. Apples were plentiful at 75c per bushel, some sales below this figure being made, however. Choice spring chickens were in demand at \$1 per pair, fat fowl, 90c to \$1 per pair and turkeys \$1 to \$1.25 per pair.
