Butter is now shipped to England in large quantities from the fertile plains of Uruguay.

The Bank of Commerce, Wednesday, received the first gold shipment of the season from London City, amounting to about \$217,000.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY

DISCUSSION ON REGINA INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

Principal Patrick Opposes the Recommendation to Hand it Over to Indian Department—Church's Religious Instruction Would Cease if This Was Done.

This morning, the General Assembly renewed discussion on the aged and infirm ministers' fund report presented by J. K. Macdonald. The following ministers, on account of long years of service, old age and ill-health, were placed on the fund: Revs. James Lawrence, Winnipeg; Thomas Fenwick, Henry Sinclair and Dr. Robert C. Moffatt, Toronto; Dr. Fletcher, Hamilton; K. Macdonald, Glangarry; James McCleary, Kingston; James Lang, Kamloops; Alexander Henderson, London; Donald I. McLean, Lanark; John Robertson, Miramichi; Henri Edmond, Sargente; Alexander Dunn and J. M. McCleod, New Westminster; J. M. Cameron, Inletary. Dr. Campbell, Bonfret, Mr. McCleod has served fifty years in the ministry, Dr. Fletcher forty-four years and Mr. McLean forty-two years.

The report of the Presbyterian Ladies' College, Ottawa, was presented by Mrs. J. W. B. In. As the moderator, Dr. Armstrong, is president of the college, he vacated the chair and requested Rev. Dr. Milligan to preside. The college attendance was 152; number in residence forty-five. The sum of \$10,000 is required for additions. Queen's University has consented to allow that the diploma of the college covering the subjects of matriculation shall be accepted as equivalent to matriculation at Queen's. Mr. Mills stated that the Presbyterian church had been remiss in supplying intermediate college education to its young women and boys. The assembly placed on record its appreciation of the work done by this college and commended it to the liberality of the church. The moderator declared that the Presbyterian church should set to work to make out of her young women the very best. They are to have the influence upon the home and upon the church. Presbyterians, the moderator said, should bestir themselves and support institutions which are theirs.

Rev. Mr. Martin, of Peterboro, introduced the foreign mission report recommendations, as follows: That the salary of the secretary Rev. Dr. McKay be increased to \$2,400; that the transfer of the presbytery of Inverness to the Presbyterian church in India be granted; that the question of the Regina Indian industrial school be left to the foreign mission committee, which shall decide whether to transfer it to the Indian department, or to provide the deficits that have occurred since its establishment; that a conference of representatives of the different Protestant churches be invited in order to discuss freely the existing policy of Indian education and suggest such modifications as may seem desirable.

The first two recommendations were adopted, but Principal Patrick and Prof. Bryce opposed that concerning the Regina industrial school. Mr. Martin said that the school has a loss of \$4,000 last year. The school was not worth the expenditure to the church. Rev. Dr. Warden had expressed the opinion that the church should hand over the school to the department and cease work there. Principal Patrick claimed that there was some mistake in Mr. Martin's conception of the commission's finding. If the church gave up the school, the Presbyterian church would not be able to deal with the flow of students, as it can through its industrial school.

Rev. Prof. Baird pointed out that the foreign mission committee must give a free hand and allowed to act immediately, because there had to be a conference with the government over the matter. Longer delay would just mean further deficits. Principal Patrick pointed out that if the assembly gave such power to the committee, it simply could surrender the school to the department for any consideration. It would part with its school, the most effective among the Indians, and what would become of the religious instruction. The question was laid over until before a meeting of the assembly adjourned at noon to meet at ten o'clock Monday morning. This afternoon, its members attended the city's complimentary excursion on the steamer Anson.

MERIT RECOGNIZED.

Promotion of Col. Wilson Gives Entire Satisfaction.

A promotion which has been received with approbation by the Canadian militia is that of Col. J. F. Wilson, up until a recent date commandant of the fortress at Quebec. He has been appointed commander-in-chief of the whole of the Royal Canadian Artillery. Col. Wilson joined the original school of gunnery at Kingston on February 1st, 1872, the original school of gunnery at Kingston and Quebec having been established by the Canadian government on the withdrawal of the imperial troops from Canada, October 21st, 1871. Col. Wilson's regiment, of which he has just been made colonel-commandant, has grown from those two original schools of gunnery to its present establishment, approximately 1,500 strong, composed of five garrison companies and two field batteries. Of the garrison companies two are at Quebec, two at Halifax, and one at Esquimaux. The two field batteries are at Kingston. Col. Wilson is to-day by many years the senior duty officer doing regular work in the permanent force at Canada.

THE OFFER ACCEPTED.
New York, June 10.—It is stated authoritatively that definite knowledge has been obtained that both the Russian and Japanese government have accepted President Roosevelt's suggestion that the meeting of representatives of the two contending powers is assured.

ARE STILL IN JAIL.

Deserters Will Likely Be Allowed to Remain in the States.
The two artillery deserters who went across from here last week, and got away from Immigrant Inspector Lewis, at Cape Vincent, thus escaping here, are still in jail at Watertown, N.Y., and will not likely be brought back. Arrangements are being made for the tax to be paid, the Thousand Island Steamboat company having to do this. The deserters will then remain in Watertown.

The present troubles about deportation would not arise if the former custom of having a United States immigration officer at Kingston was revived. A Mr. Conway used to do the duty of that office here, and the head tax was collected before those liable left on the steamer. Those who would not be allowed to enter the States were warned not to attempt to go over, and thus the present troubles were not met with. It would be a great convenience to the Thousand Island Steamboat company were a U. S. immigrant agent stationed here.

Improving The Court House.
The repairs to the front steps of the court house have been nearly completed. It is considered by some that a concrete platform at the top of the steps is necessary as the top of the steps is becoming undermined by water leaking through from the cracks in the stones above. This had in time prove disastrous to the pillars, having the plumbers at their foundation. Another improvement is being made to the external appearance of the building by fresh painting and graining all of the doors. A further suggested improvement to the building is the coming in of large glass vestibule entrances at either end of the building in place of the present somewhat disfiguring entrances. These proposed improvements will probably be brought up at a meeting of the county property committee in the near future.

Soldier And Women Back.
Last evening, one of the artillerymen who went away on Wednesday to the other side arrived on the steamer New Island Wanderer. His companion remained at Cape Vincent. The returned soldier wore most of his uniform, but had a pair of tan boots and a yachting cap. He seemed relieved when he was brought up on the wharf to arrest him, as one had been waiting there the day before. The young man went up Brock street, and hurried along Ontario street westward. The two women, who went to the Cape, on Thursday, and were to be met there by the two who were sent back by Immigrant Inspector Lewis, and arrived back yesterday afternoon.

NEWS OF THE WORLD

OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody
—Notes From All Over—Little Of Everything Easily Read And Remembered.
The invested capital of the Synod of Toronto, was increased last year by \$44,326.21 and now stands at \$875,339.10.

John A. MacDonald, Alexandria, Ont., has been appointed caretaker of the post office at Alexandria at \$1 per day.
As a result of an investigation by the police committee the entire night force of Yarmouth, E.S., tendered their resignations.
Morrisburg has changed the dates of its fair from September 5th, 6th and 7th to August 30th, 31st and September 1st. The former date conflicted with Cornwall and Winchester.

Morrisburg has an area of 1,118 acres, with a total assessment of \$855,150, of which \$728 is a business tax and \$40,550 income tax. The population is 1,507. The assessment for 1904 was \$536,000.
Another Russian red cross scandal has developed through the discovery that a donation of 5,000 pounds of tobacco intended for distribution among the soldiers in the fields is now on sale at Harbin.
The government of Chili has presented to congress a motion to raise a loan of \$6,000,000 for the construction of a railroad throughout the entire country. This railroad will form part of the Panama railroad.

Three fires took place in the vicinity of Winchester. Edgar Locke's barns were destroyed by fire with contents. Martin Durant's pump factory caught fire, but was saved with little damage, and W. J. Robinson's house was destroyed.
The University of King's College, Windsor, N.S., has conferred on Dr. Henry J. Morgan, Ottawa, the honorary degree of D.C.L., in recognition of his literary work and services. Dr. Morgan was already LL.D. of the University of Ottawa.
Iroquois \$9,762.70 granolithic walk debentures have been sold to Wood, Gundy & Co., Toronto, for \$9,757.70, and accrued interest from January 1st to June 1st, 1905, or at a premium of \$237.60. The debentures are drawing four and one-half per cent., payable in twenty years.

The game was highly exciting at times, the preachers "digging in" with a vehemence not altogether divine.
