#### TWO PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE PRINCIPALS.

Heard in the Churches—Principal Patrick, in Chalmers, on "The Sinlessness of Jesus—Principal Falconer in Sydenham Street Methodist.

Two Presbyterian college principals were heard in the churches yesterday. One was from the extreme east of Canada, and the other from the far west.

#### LIEUT. COL. JOHN KERR CALLED TO REST.

Passed Quietly Away Sunday Morning—One of Kingston's Oldest Masons—A Long and Honorable Career.

Lieut. Col. John Kerr died, Sunday morning, at 6:30 o'clock at his late residence, 155 Earl street. He had attained the ripe age of eighty-seven years and had enjoyed good health up to within a few months of his demise.

The deceased was, in politics, a moderate conservative and had many warm friends in all classes and parties. He was an enthusiastic Mason, his career in the order being one of long membership and honorable attainments.

Lieut. Col. Kerr was born in Roxburghshire, Scotland, and when about eleven years of age, he came to Montreal in 1832 with his parents, and later he became apprenticed as an engineer to his uncle, who had a large foundry in that city.
