**WAIT FOR A TIME**

**BEFORE TAKING OUT STREET RAILWAY GENERATORS.**

From the Light and Power Plant  
—Committee Expectant of  
Developments—General Busi-  
ness Transacted at Yester-  
day's Meeting.

The Light, Heat and Power company  
committee met Tuesday afternoon.  
Those present were Alds. King, An-  
grove, Toye, Walkem, Givens, Kent  
and McCann.

In regard to W. J. Crothers' claim  
for \$15 damages, it was decided, on  
motion of Ald. Angrove, that no ac-  
tion be taken. Mr. Campbell's report  
showing no liability.

In regard to the tenders for coal,  
the chairman stated that the city pro-  
perty and waterworks committees had  
asked to combine with this committee  
in securing tenders. It was decided  
to advertise for coal for waterworks and  
this committee combined, tenders to  
be sent in by the 20th inst., the chair-  
man to be authorized to accept the  
lowest tender.

Mr. Campbell reported that the pur-  
chase of the dynamo, which had been  
authorized at the last meeting, had  
been completed, the total cost being  
\$1,100. The contract was presented and  
presented and ordered paid, on mo-  
tion of Ald. Givens. The chairman re-  
ported that a quantity of pipe had  
been purchased from John Coates &  
Co., Ottawa and London, Eng., at a  
reduction of \$1.25 per ton on lowest  
Canadian figures, the same to be de-  
livered in thirty days. On motion of  
Ald. Toye the chairman's action was  
confirmed. J. M. Campbell was autho-  
rized to purchase special castings for  
the twelve-inch main, on motion of  
Ald. Walkem.

J. M. Campbell reported that an ex-  
cavation contract awarded to Park &  
Button had been rejected by the com-  
mittee and had been taken over by Langley  
Bird, on the same terms as the former  
contract. On motion of Ald. Givens,  
Bird was given the privilege of draw-  
ing his pay under the same conditions  
as prevailed before.

Complaint was made by Alfred Street  
residents in regard to dirt being  
thrown on the sidewalk. The city  
engineer explained that this was  
due to the unsatisfactory work of the  
contractors on that work. It was de-  
cided to relieve the contractors from  
their work and finish the work by day  
labor.

J. M. Campbell reported that the  
Davis Tammy company was desirous of  
securing electric power. He stated  
that the investment would produce  
over ten per cent. revenue. The com-  
mittee were favorably disposed to  
accept the project, but the matter was  
allowed to stand until the next meet-  
ing of the committee.

On motion of Ald. Kent it was de-  
cided that the tender of the Canadian  
General Electric company for wire at  
\$17.25 per cwt., be accepted. On mo-  
tion of Ald. Toye, twenty ten-ampere  
meters and two ten-ampere ammeters  
were ordered to be purchased. On  
motion of Ald. Walkem, it was de-  
cided to call for tenders for two closets  
for the plant.

Mr. Campbell reported that the ar-  
rival of two new dynamo for the ap-  
plant will necessitate the removal of  
the street railway generators from the  
plant in order to supply the necessary  
space. It was decided to wait for a  
short time on the possible change in  
developments in the street railway sit-  
uation may arise. Mr. Campbell stated  
that if the street cars secure power  
from the city, with the present plant,  
it will not be possible to place a gen-  
erator for both city and street car use.  
This could be done temporarily by  
adding a separate engine to work in  
connection with the present plant.

By the action of the committee in  
appointing Ald. Toye as special agent  
in regard to the management of the plant,  
as the term of J. M. Campbell expires  
on August 1st.

**HOW TO GROW RASPBERRIES.**

An Agricultural College Expert  
Gives a Few Points.

This berry succeeds best on light  
well-drained soil. The red varieties are pro-  
pagated by suckers that come up  
from the roots of the old plants, from  
the black caps by tips. The young canes  
grow up, turn over and the points  
take root in the soil, usually in Au-  
gust or September. In most sections  
the reds are cultivated in rows six to  
eight feet apart and the plants two  
and one-half feet apart in the row.  
Then let the suckers fill up between to  
form a solid row.

The blackes are usually planted in  
hills four or five feet apart each  
way. In order to get a big crop of  
large berries it is necessary to give  
liberal application of manure and  
good clean cultivation. It has been  
found of late years that I can keep  
up the size of my berries much bet-  
ter by cultivating right through the  
picking season. Run through with  
the cultivator after each picking, to  
stir the soil, break up the crust for-  
med by the tramping of the pickers  
and to form a mulch.

An important point in raspberry  
growing is the summer pruning. As  
soon as the young canes reach a  
height of three feet, usually about the  
middle of July, we go through and  
cut off the ends of the canes. This  
checks the upward growth, makes  
them grow stocky and causes them to  
ripen up and form a better quality of  
wood, which is not so apt to freeze  
back in winter. We usually remove all  
dead wood and surplus canes in the  
spring. Three good varieties are  
Marlborough for early, Outburr for  
main crop, and Golden Queen the  
best winter variety.
