**THE COUNTY POOR WILL BE CARED FOR BY THE CITY.**

Township Council Will Be Made Pay for the Maintenance of the Indigent from the Different Municipalities — A New Plan.

When the county council convened Wednesday afternoon, a deputation, comprising Alds. R. Meek, F. King, F. G. Hoag, and William J. Crothers, William F. Nickle, and W. G. Craig, representing the board of the House of Industry, addressed the members with reference to an increased grant. The different members of the deputation outlined the good work the House of Industry was accomplishing in caring for aged, infirm and homeless. All patients from the county are maintained, and the small grant received from the county, namely, \$75, is inadequate to cover the expenses incurred by these patients.

Mr. Nickle pointed out that last year the total stay of county patients was greater than that of city patients, yet the county gave a grant only of \$75, while the city gave \$500 free house, exemption from taxation,

the county is responsible. These are for the most part infirm ex-residents of Frontenac.

Warden Sproule was about to refer the request to the finance committee, when Mr. Nickle asked if the directors of the House of Industry were to demand that the recommendation of the finance committee would represent the maximum grant of the county? If the sum named is not satisfactory to the board, are the directors at liberty to turn out the county patients, at present in the institution, and refuse to accept any more unless accompanied by letters from wardens of townships, assuming responsibility for their maintenance? If this is done it will mean the filling up of the county jail, and adding additional cost upon the county for maintenance. The institution would rather be without the county's poor, as all the space in the home is needed for the poor of the city. What the city needs badly is a home for incurables.

Councillor Spoor outlined a scheme to have the county pay the cost of all county patients at the figure named by Mr. Nickle, \$150 per week per inmate, and taking the townships to cover the outlay.

Councillor Pillar favored the county and city maintaining the institution jointly.

County Clerk Edwards took the ground that each township should pay for its own poor, and this scheme could be carried out. If he was notified

etc. Surely the county did not expect the city to maintain county patients.

Councillor Black held that each township should maintain its poor, as does Hinchinbrook.

Warden Sproule considered the request of the deputation for an increased grant a reasonable one. There were two schemes whereby the poor of the county could be maintained: the county could give an adequate grant to the Kingston House of Industry, or the city and county could affiliate and maintain the institution jointly. Then, on the other hand, townships could be made maintain their respective poor.

Councillor Pillar agreed that the House of Industry was doing good work, and should receive every encouragement from the county, which he considered, was not giving a sufficiently large grant. He moved that the question of an increased grant be referred to the finance committee.

Councillor Fringle also expressed sympathy with the request of the deputation. He had always held the opinion that the county should maintain its poor. If townships would contribute towards the maintenance of a central house of refuge, the proportionate cost would be met, and in cases where townships undertake themselves to maintain the poor, he would favor making the Kingston House of Industry a county institution, in part. The county ratemongers never consent to build a house of refuge as long as they could palm off their poor on some other municipality. He would support an increased grant to the Kingston House of Industry, but maintained that the county should have an institution of its own for the care of the poor.

Councillor Spoor was heartily in favor of making an increased grant to the House of Industry. For years past a scheme had been under consideration of having a house of refuge erected and maintained jointly by the counties of Lennox, Addington and Frontenac, but so far nothing had come of the plan. He would not now favor that scheme, but would rather see county and city combine and maintain House of Industry; for the time being he would favor a larger grant. Each township should be compelled to maintain its own poor, and those refusing or neglecting to do so, were pauper townships on the county. The county council should draw the attention of townships to the privileges they are enjoying in the House of Industry, and he requested to contribute their share towards maintenance of their poor confined therein.

Mr. Nickle pointed out some of the difficulties met with by the directors of the House of Industry in seeking to recover expenses. He stated that the sum total of the county's grant in one year, The institution is at present maintaining ten patients for whom

the secretary of the House of Industry of the acceptance of township patients, he in turn would apprise townships, and that of responsibility would be fixed and cost of care of patients received.

Ald. Meek said Dr. Edwards' plan was acceptable, and they would agree to appoint a committee to confer with one from the county council to elaborate and perfect such a plan. Meanwhile the county should grant the institution an increased sum for maintenance of county inmates now in the home.

The question of an increased grant will be dealt with by the finance committee.

**Other Business.**

Councillors Pillar and Shannon presented a by-law to authorize the warden and treasurer to borrow \$15,000 to pay current accounts.

Councillors Cox and Tapping presented a by-law confirming a by-law passed by the township of Olden, to build a forty foot road in the 11th concession, across lot 22.

Councillors Tapping and Shannon presented a by-law appointing a county solicitor, T. L. Snook, at a salary of \$150 a year.

Councillor Tapping presented the report of a committee, to the effect that toll road companies be notified that the county would not be responsible for the repairs of any portion of said toll roads, nor for damages arising from the repair of the same, that the matter of responsibility for Loughboro Lake bridge be left in the hands of the chairman of the committee on roads and bridges.

The report was unanimously adopted.

Picton, June 14.—From happy smiles to the agony of excruciating pain was the extreme to which little Blake Cole, the five-year old son of R. J. Cole was subjected, Tuesday. The little fellow was playfully riding horse back while his father was cultivating in a field along the railroad track, near the station. The horse was a quiet one, and had never been known to be afraid of trains, but as the C. O. R. came in with bell ringing, the animal became alarmed, shied, and bolted, throwing the child from its back. In falling the lad struck the cultivator, breaking his leg just above the knee and severely bruising his head.

Two young men from the Bloomfield vicinity were the cause of much excitement Tuesday evening, finally landing up in the jail for the night. Considerable unrest in the town of Inverary they drove to town, five miles at the pace that kills.
