Care Of The Poor.

The city, through members of the House of Industry and Finance Committee, and the county, through its council, have conferred with regard to the care of the poor. It seems that the institution is in need of further financial aid. Its revenues are confined to the grants from the government, the city, and the county. It occasionally receives a small bequest and certain citizens besides giving their time to the management, contribute a considerable sum in fees.

The government inspector—a new one, representing a new government—has demanded that expensive changes be made in the building and its equipment. The improvements will cost \$2,000 or more. The facts were laid before the county council because it was felt that the county should increase its grant very materially. It gives \$75 a year now. The city gives \$800, and yet the record shows that in the collective days, which indicate the presence and care of the inmates, the county's representation has been larger than the city's.

Incidentally the question of providing a refuge for the county or the united counties and Frontenac came up. It has been long contemplated and the position of the House of Industry suggested the consideration of the question now. Of course, the scheme—the building of a suitable house on a suitable ground—will take some time, especially if several municipalities have to be consulted. In the meanwhile a larger grant is desired by the city refuge, and the county council is considering it, and, in connection with it, the development of a plan by which every inmate from the county will be recognized and provided for upon a fixed and satisfactory basis.

Collapse Of Scandals.

The tory opposition in the commons is having a hard time of it and must be excused when it makes a fuss, sometimes, without much purpose. During the bye-elections it was particularly exercised and about two reports.

One was that a contingent of military men had been sent to the Niagara camp. This was regarded as a diabolical attempt to prevent the men from voting. It was assumed that they were Tories, but on election day Mr. Hyman was enquiring about them and the conclusion was that they were not all his opponents. The fact is that the men were sent out by the adjutant-general without any thought of the election. When Col. Otter was ordered by telegraph to send them back to London he wired that they had been given the opportunity of voting and declined to avail themselves of it. So much for conspiracy No. 1.

The second awful offence charged against the government was that it did not send out proper forms of oath to the returning officer and his deputies. The insinuation was that the secretary of state had lent himself to an infamous plot to affect the bye-elections. Mr. Burden made it the subject of a heated speech. Sir Wilfrid repelled the insult that had been cast upon his aged colleague, Senator Scott, and Mr. Fitzpatrick, the minister of justice, proved that the law had been complied with, and that the only oath that could be used, in alleged bribery cases, was contained in the federal act. The provincial oath could not be used. So ended conspiracy No. 2.

The sudden collapse of two grievances added to the discomfort of the men who were in doleful humour at the time, and felt that they were not in the popular current as they supposed.

Seeing And Learning.

The two hundred and fifty manufacturers who have gone to the old land, upon a tour of investigation, will see a great deal that will be of advantage to them. The delegates from the Canadian Manufacturers Association will be the guests of the London Chamber of Commerce while in the metropolis, and they will spend several days in the great city and come into contact with its heart throbs. London reflects the business light and life of the world. There more can be learned of trade and commerce than anywhere else.

Then the party will set out for a ten or twelve days' tour of the great cities. The stay in them will be necessarily short, but it will be so arranged that the visitors will cover the most ground in the time at their disposal. With each halt there will be a fresh revelation of old land marks, traditions and promises, and Canada's intelligence and Britain's intelligence

will flash alternately and for their mental illumination.

A year or more ago there was a great meeting in Montreal. Here much of the same material, as representing the commercial life of the old land and the new, met, and it will be remembered that some effort was made to peer into the future and outline the relations that would be for the best of the mother country and the colonies. Then there was a brilliant and impressive exchange of views. Men spoke as they understood local or national issues. They discussed business policies freely. They did not, however, discern things as moulders and fashioners of political policies, and so far there has not been any change in them.

There is no doubt that the journey of our manufacturers to the old land now will be educational in its results. Two years ago some of the most successful agriculturists in the North-West were persuaded to go to England, Ireland and Scotland, and recite their experiences. They were better than the immigration agents. They had no object save to state the unvarnished facts, and their mission was crowned with the highest success. The Canadian manufacturers and the British manufacturers do not see eye to eye in many respects. They may never be able to harmonize their differences, but they will have a more definite opinion of each other's position and have a greater care for its protection.

Mr. Chamberlain has not made much progress with his imperial plans of late, because he has not been able to say what will satisfy the mother country and the colonies. It was suggested that he visit Canada, that he confer with her leaders of the people, that he enquire into the operations of the preference, and reflect upon the situation as he found it. He has not been able to observe Canadian conditions at close range and it is to his disadvantage. The Canadian manufacturers have had their own ideas of a preference. They have reached their conclusions from a look at events and circumstances on this side of the water. They may revise their ideas somewhat when they have seen circumstances on the other side of them.

Editorial Notes.

There is going to be a protest in London. The men who conducted the meanest election in Canada are aching for revenge.

The Hamilton Herald is correct in interpreting the feeling of London and North Oxford as indicative of that in Ontario. Toronto should be excepted. It is the stamping ground of bigots and fanatics.

Col. Little of London, put the situation thus: "If a Catholic hierarchy asks for something right the Protestants will give it to them. If a Methodist hierarchy, or any other 'archy,' want to lead the people astray the people will not follow them."

There was a great shout as Dr. Spronde and others, who had participated in the bye-elections entered the Commons on Tuesday evening. Mr. Foster was speaking. He turned about in attitude of enquiry. "Oh go on," some one remarked; "they're only bringing in the wounded."

Mr. Wallace, in North Oxford, on election day, was quite satisfied that he would be a member of parliament by evening. He has now been three times thrown down and must realize the force of a well-known remark. "That there is nothing so uncertain as a horse race or an election."

The Spectator is candid in demanding to know whether Hon. Mr. Cochrane is interested in the mines and timber limits of Ontario. If so he should not be a minister; if not the fact should be plainly stated. "The Whitney government," says the Spectator, "should avoid the appearance of evil."

While the returns were rolling in, and showing that he was badly defeated, Gray, the tory candidate in London, was telling the people that he had the evidence of terrible corruption. How much does any man know about the details of an election while the votes are being tallied up? Nothing, absolutely nothing.

A correspondent of the Toronto World howls because Mr. Grey, the tory candidate in London, lost twenty-six votes, the ballots being spoiled. It is alleged Grey was cheated out of these votes because the name was printed so close to the margin that the electors put their marks on the other side. Rubbish! Twenty-six spoiled ballots in a total of 8,500 is a very small percentage.

RUSTY SPOTS ON CHEESE,

Cleanliness One of the Requisites of the Cheese Factory.

Prof. H. A. Haveling, of the Geneva Station, during an address recently delivered by him spoke as follows on the best method to pursue in stamping out an "epidemic" of rusty spots in cheddar cheese.

"The interior of cheese looks as though it had been lightly sprayed with red ink or cheese color. The spots appear when the cheese is from four to six days old an increase in size from day to day. They are caused by the growth in the cheese of a red bacterium, just as green streaks in stale bread are caused by the growth of a green mould.

"The first thing required is a thorough cleaning up of the factory. Hot water and polish will cut the grease from the floor and a fresh coat of whitewash will brighten up the ceilings and walls. When the cheese is in press and everything cleaned up for the day, the curd mill and every implement or piece of cloth which will come in contact with the milk the following day is placed in the vat and a heavy canvas stretched tightly over the top. Live steam is turned into the vat fast enough to bring the temperature of the vat at the corners up to 150 degrees within five minutes. The steam should be continued at least fifteen minutes after this temperature is reached, so that the steam will have plenty of time to penetrate into every crevice of the tools. When the time is up, the steam is shut off, and the canvas cover removed.


"In a couple of minutes the tools can be picked up and in most cases they will be so hot as to dry without any need of wiping. In case it is necessary to wipe them, a new cloth should be used, or one which has been recently boiled, to avoid re-soiling the tools. The weight can be made in the vat, a steam hose passed in through the faucet. This should be steamed for the same length of time as the vat. The next morning the hoops and followers, with their cloths, should be treated in the same way, except that it is desirable to have a separate place for treating them on account of the large amount of fat, which is removed by the heat. The entire treatment should be repeated three times a week. We believe this treatment will also be found very useful in combating many other milk troubles. In four factories in which this method has been employed rusty spot has been controlled without any financial loss, on the cheese."
