NEWS OF THE WORLD

OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody -Notes From All Over-Little Of Everything Easily Read And Remembered.

The Russian cruiser, Don, is cooling at Amsterdam. The International Waterways commission concluded its sitting, in Toronto, last night.

German steamer Tetaroff, was sunk by the cruiser, Don, though she had no contraband on board.

Miss Susan Diamond was committed for trial at Madras, on a charge of poisoning her son's wife.

Civic census figures now being taken for the city of Winnipeg show indications of a population of 100,000.

Much apprehension is felt in government circles in London as to the crisis between Germany and France on the Morocco question.

Rev. Mr. McClure, Hillsbury, has received a call to the pulpit of the Christian Workers' church, Toronto, and has accepted.

Albert Edward Pocock, a real estate agent, of Reading, was arrested in Montreal, and sentenced to five years for the forgery and theft of title deeds.

A fire did \$17,100 damage in a block on Tecumseh street, Toronto, occupied by the Palmer Piano company as a storage for lumber, the Fairies Milling company as a shipping room for a flour mill, and the J. Gillespie Mill company.

The Toronto Anglican synod, at its session, this morning, passed a resolution approving of the adoption of a new hymn book for Canada. It also decided to ask the general synod to revise the book of common prayer, so as to make it more suitable for services in Canada.

Mr. Smith, the Toronto chauffeur, who struck Lenton Williams, while running his auto along College street, Toronto, last Wednesday morning, the accident resulting in Williams' death, was released when he appeared in the police court on the charge of manslaughter, to-day.

JAPAN SEA BATTLE

TOGO'S REPORT TELLS OF RUSSIAN DISASTER.

Under Cover of Darkness—Horde of Torpedoes Completed—Destruction—Negotiations, Surrounded, Had to Surrender.

London, June 16.—Following is Admiral Togo's official report of the battle of the Sea of Japan: "Our order for action was at 1.35 p.m. We headed south-west for a short time, as if taking a course directly opposite to that of the enemy. Suddenly, at 2.05, we turned east, charging from the enemy's head-on, and pressed diagonally against the enemy's head-on, the armored cruiser squadron closely followed our course, while the divisions of Admirals Dewa and Uriu, the cruiser squadron and the division commanded by the younger Togo, followed a course previously planned and proceeded southward to attack the enemy's rear.

The enemy opened fire at 2.08 p.m. We then opened fire until we had brought our ships within six thousand metres. The main concentration of our fire on the two leading ships. The enemy found himself pressed more toward the south-east, and both his lines veered gradually to the eastward, assuming an irregular vertical formation. In this position the enemy continued a course parallel to ours. The Russian battleships Oslavaya caught fire and left the line. Meanwhile our cruisers appeared in the enemy's rear.

As we neared, our fire increased in effectiveness. The Kniaz Souvovoff and the Alexander III, burned fiercely. The enemy's line became confused, and the ships began to separate. Therefore, we surprised them. The result of the battle was decided at 3.48 p.m. The Oslavaya sank by 3 p.m. We pressed the enemy southward, firing when any of their ships were visible. By three o'clock we had already appeared in front of the enemy's line of advance, our course being about south-west.

Suddenly the enemy headed north, evidently planning to escape in that direction, around our rear. Our main squadron turned sixteen and headed north-west. Our armored cruisers also changed front, following the same course and pressing the enemy southward. The enemy then changed to the east, and we promptly turned sixteen and pressed the enemy southward. By 4.40 o'clock the enemy seemed to be headed south, but we lost sight of him in the smoke and mist.

By 4.30 o'clock our main squadron was again steaming northward in search of the main body of the enemy. Our main squadron sank the Ural and found six of the enemy's ships running north-east. We pursued and caught them and opened fire. The enemy changed his course westward and then north-westward. One of the enemy's battleships was disabled and another was sunk. Our armored cruisers, pursuing the enemy southward, observed the Alexander III, approaching the Admiral Nakimoff and overtook and sank it at twilight. Our destroyers and torpedo boats gradually closed in from the northeast, and south. Finding them placed, our main squadron let loose their horde of torpedoes.

"I ordered all ships to assemble at Ulan Island at 6 a.m. Sunday. Admiral Togo then describes the attack of Admirals Dewa and Uriu upon the Russian near May 27th.

Describing the events of Sunday, Admiral Togo declares that his battleships, Kamimura's cruisers, Uriu's division, and the younger Togo's division, completely enveloped Admiral Negobatoff's ships, rendering resistance hopeless. The Japanese commander-in-chief allowed Admiral Negobatoff and his officers to retain a few words.

Accepted Resignation. St. Petersburg, June 16.—The names of Vice-Admiral Birlikoff, who is returning from Vladivostok, and of Vice-Admiral Choukine, commander of the Black Sea fleet, are mentioned among those likely to succeed Admiral Avelan.

The emperor accepted the resignation of Grand Duke Alexis in the following receipt: "His imperial majesty, my father, highly esteeming your experience in naval affairs, and your personal and moral qualities, selected you, in 1881, as his immediate collaborator in the work of reorganizing and strengthening our fleet. Since then, for twenty-four years, your imperial highness has devoted your naval talents to the development of our naval armaments, and to the training of the personnel of the fleet in proportion to the resources it was possible to accord you for that purpose."

Now, yielding to your repeated requests, I have consented to relieve you of the administration of the fleet and marine department.

In accepting the resignation of your imperial highness I direct you to retain the rank of grand admiral as an expression of my gratitude for all your services.

"I remain, as ever, your constant well-wisher with every expression of my love."

May End Operations. St. Petersburg, June 16.—The latest news from the front indicates that the rainy season is beginning sooner than usual. If the downpour continues the military operations, necessarily, will come to a standstill without an armistice. There is some talk that Foreign Minister Lamsdorf, himself, may be one of the plenipotentiaries.

The Annual Statement. Special to the Whig. Montreal, June 16.—The annual statement of the Merchants Bank of Canada shows a surplus of \$649,000, after the usual provision for bad and doubtful debts, etc. The balance for last year amounted to a total of \$758,197, after adding to rest \$200,000, writing off \$30,000 on bank premises and adding \$139,000 to pension fund, there was carried over \$73,197.
