Milk Fever In Cows.

Dr. G. W. Bell, veterinary, says that many cows in this district are affected by milk fever, which comes on from twelve to twenty-four hours after calving. It is due to heavy flow resulting to plentifulness grass, and is found only in good cat tle. The first symptom is a staggering gait, and afterwards the cow finds mpossible to rise. The animal should be kept lying flat. As many as four cases in a week have been reported.
