SPORT REVIEW.
Notes on Baseball, Lacrosse and Other Sports.

The Winnipeg Rowing Club has decided to institute a series of semi-monthly regattas.

The Canadian Amateur Athletic Union has decided to face the question of professionalism in lacrosse. President Gorman has called a meeting of the board of governors for that special purpose.

It was said that the life lacrosse in Brantford depended on the result of Saturday's game, and the management floated from the masthead Togo's motto: "The fate of the empire depends on you." Brantford, however, met defeat.

The match at Paris between the United States and French polo teams for the International cup, resulted in a victory for France by six goals to four. The match took place at Bagatelle, in the Bois de Boulogne, and was attended by many prominent members of society.

Seventeen thousand persons saw Yale win the third deciding game for the baseball championship of 1905, between Yale and Princeton, at the Polo grounds. Yale's victory was somewhat unexpected, but it was gained by a fairly good margin, the final score being eight to five.

Two strong teams representing England and Scotland, containing many of the best known amateur footballers, will leave in November next to play against the association leagues in Canada and also give three or four exhibition games in the United States, with the hope that the Americans will take an interest in the game.

Provision for the double referee system, the stiffening of punishments for rough play and a definite arrangement for the play off in case of a tie at the end of the usual four quarters were the features of the business transacted Saturday night at a special meeting of the committee of management of the National Amateur Lacrosse Union.

As a meeting of the University of Toronto Rugby Football Club, A. W. McPherson was appointed manager of the senior team. Mr. McPherson has been one of the valuable back-backs for two years. With Ottawa College in the Intercollegiate Union, this season, necessitating a longer schedule, special practices will be necessary. Candidates for the team will be out early in September.

LEEDS FARMERS' INSTITUTE.
The Annual Meeting and Officers Chosen.

The annual meeting of this institute was held at Gananoque last Wednesday. The financial report showed the year's receipts to have been \$105.25, and the expenditure, including a deficit from last year of \$13.91, \$89.95, leaving a surplus of \$5.30. The Canadian North-West.
HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS
Any seven hundred acres of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Territories, excepting 9 and 10, which has not been homesteaded or reserved, provides wood lots for settlers, for other purposes, may be homesteaded upon by any settler who has been in possession of the land for one year or more up to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

ENTRY
Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or by a settler who has been in possession of the land for one year or more, or by a settler who has been in possession of the land for one year or more, or by a settler who has been in possession of the land for one year or more.

HOMESTEAD DUTIES
A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required by the provisions of the Dominion Lands Act, and the amendments thereto, to perform the conditions annexed therewith, and one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon the cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years. It is the practice of the Department to require stock; and 20 head of cattle, to be actually his own property, with buildings for the accommodation, will be accepted instead of the cultivation.

(2) If the settler was entitled to obtain a patent may be eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this act, residence upon the land in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of this act as to residence prior to obtaining a patent may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If a settler was entitled to obtain a patent may be eligible to make a homestead entry for a second homestead satisfied by residence upon the first homestead, if the second homestead is in the vicinity of the first homestead.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT
Should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector. Before making application for patent, the settler should give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of his intention to do so.

Newly arrived immigrants will receive at the Immigration Office in Winnipeg, or at any Dominion Land Office in Manitoba or the North-West Territories, information as to the lands that are open for entry, and from the officers in charge free of expense, advice and assistance in securing lands to enter them. Full information respecting the land, timber, coal and mineral laws, as well as respecting Dominion Lands in British Columbia, may be obtained upon application to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa; the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, Manitoba; or to any of the Dominion Land Offices in Manitoba or the North-West Territories.
