FOR THE FARMER

INFORMATION THAT IS PROFITABLE.

Fluck Blossoms of Newly Planted Strawberry Vines—To Save Waste of Hay—Cheapest Way to Fatten Old Cows.

The bluebirds, the wrens and the sparrows will often have a protracted fight for the possession of some choice nesting place. We find where such a fight is on that it pays to shoot the sparrows and let the others settle it. Lawn trees are best selected from the slow growing or the dwarf types of trees. The hackberry, the hard maple, the black cherry, the mountain ash, the wild thorn and crab apple, the cut leaf birch, all make admirable lawn trees. The soft maple, the cottonwood, the box elder and willow should never be used for this purpose.

The traction engine is coming more and more into use on the large farms as a motive power for plowing. Some very remarkable and effective work is being done by these engines on the big small grain farms of the North-West.

The blossoms which appear on the strawberry bed set out this spring should be removed and no fruit be allowed to set. The young plant needs all its vigor to induce a healthy growth, which, the bearing of fruit prevents.

Hay always keeps with a smaller per cent. of waste in a large stack than in a small one; hence an investment in a stack cover always pays. With the cover a stack may be kept open for several days and be made of any size desired.

To take care of a field of corn just right you want a broad, light harrow, a weeder to use under the conditions be just right, a double shovel plow for the one deep plowing which the crop should have and a surface cultivator for the last two plowings and, should the season be a very dry one, a single horse cultivator to go through the field after the corn has tasseled out.

It is very easy to get too much shade around the home. Two things should be watched—one, that the sunshine is not barred from the roof of the house, for green shingles made by doctors' bills; another, that there should not be so much shade on the lawn that the grass will not maintain a vigorous and healthy growth.

The green roof and the bare and patchy lawn can be found in connection with all too many homes. The cheapest way to fatten old cows is to turn them dry, let them summer on grass, give them a few pumpkins and a little green corn and fodder. They will get fat at small cost. It does not pay to let cows get old and broken down unless they have been valuable as breeders.

A working job may be made by cutting off about two-thirds of the end of a stout, tight barrel. The short end is filled with water and placed in the stall so that the forefeet will come in daily. An hour or two of soaking will do for dry, hard hoofs.

The place where the wild and tame animals really comes in his own is in the hands of the average farmer who seeks the best and most economical method of marketing his grain and grass.

The sowing of corn so thickly that it will not ear and cutting while green and juicy for fodder give a tender food much relished by the dairy cow. The fodder may be put in the silo or cured in the stack, but in either case it is doubtful if it contains much nourishment. It is secured as if the crop were sown thinner and left until the ears were nearly matured. Ten to fifteen pounds daily is a good ration.

Be careful of the odors in the cow stable. Milk is a stable agent. Recently by the milk and cream from a farm had a rank taste of turpentine. A visit to the stable disclosed two big boxes of turpentine stored in one part of the stable. Days when the milk was left standing a "little while" it would be almost unfit for use.

It sometimes happens that young calves when fed nice clover hay are taken with impaction of the rumen, and they generally die. We once lost a valuable cow and a fine young bull from this ailment. It is generally understood now by veterinarians that this trouble largely comes from over-feeding. The animal eats more than it can assimilate.

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After trying all sorts of experiments the doctors have arrived at the conclusion that fresh air and sunshine are the only reliable remedies for meningitis.

STOCK MARKETS.

The Prices Paid at Various Points.

Montreal, June 19.—The heavy, dull weather this morning and a more or less depressing effect upon business done at the East End Abattoir this morning. Buyers were out in large numbers, but sales were not any too brisk. The supply of stock was in excess of the demand, and the quality in all grades was not any too satisfactory.

In fact, it may be said that prices showed a downward tendency, as the market apparently is well overstocked, and especially is this true as regards lambs and calves. Cattle—Arrivals about 400 heads in all. Quality, fairly good. Quotations a shade lower than last week. Best stock sold at from 47c. to 51c. per lb.

Sheep and lambs—Arrivals, 500 head and 200 sheep. Quality good, with fair demand. Prices had a downward tendency. Sales rather slow, with a drag on lambs. Market apparently overstocked. Sheep sold at 31c. to 41c. per lb.; lambs, \$2.50 to \$4.00 each, according to quality and weight.

Calves—Arrivals, 600 head. Supply in excess of demand. Quality only fair, with quotations lower than previous market. The choice stock sold at \$8 per head, while from \$1 to \$6 was paid for the different sizes of calves.

Hogs—Arrivals about 100 head. Quality good, with slow demand. Prices lower, with quotations at 5c. per lb.; per lb., the latter paid for select.

Yield Receipts, \$1,750, active and strong, \$4.25 to \$5.75. Hogs—Receipts, 13,000 head; strong and 5c. higher and medium, \$5.65 to \$5.70; yorkers and pigs, \$5.70 to \$5.75; roughs, \$4.80 to \$5; stags, \$3.25 to \$3.75; dairies, \$5.50 to \$5.70.

Sheep and lambs—Receipts, 4,200 head; active and steady; spring lambs, \$5.50 to \$7.75; yearlings, \$6.60 to \$6.65; wethers, \$5.15 to \$5.25; ewes, \$4 to \$4.25; sheep, mixed, \$2.50 to \$4.75.

Giant Drum-Major Coming. Of more than ordinary interest is the announcement of the coming of the famous Kitties' band of Canada, who have so successfully toured the continent for the past eight months. This wonderful organization, which consists of forty bandmen, four brass pipers, seven soloists, four British military buglers, six Highland dancers, and one giant drum-major, who is over seven feet in height, is re-enforced by a splendid vocal choir of sixteen voices. The Kitties will give a concert at the Grand Opera House on Thursday, June 22nd. The band appears in full military uniform, and is splendidly equipped.

May Cut Train Off. There is a possibility that the Thursday morning market train from S. & F. railway points, between Sharn Point Lake and Kingston will be cut off. Such trains on other lines do not now run. Kingston would suffer somewhat by the loss of this train, as it brings from seventy-five to 150 people here every week to do shopping. If the management are seriously contemplating its cutting off as it is said they are, the board of trade had better make some move.

Death of Mrs. Huffman in Manitoba—Logs Going Down the River—Strawberries For Sale on Napanee Market.

Napanee, June 21.—The work of tearing down the Eastern Methodist church will commence this week. The plans for the new edifice are on a most imposing plan, and work will begin on the rebuilding as soon as the spire and walls are razed. A machine for the making of the cement blocks to be used in the building will be bought and the blocks made on the ground. Services will be held in the town hall while the repairs are being made, and it is expected that the structure will be finished by early fall.

Word was received in Napanee, of the death last week of Captain Henry Huffman at Rebers, Manitoba, son of the late Robert McD. Huffman well known at Bath. Deceased went west many years ago. A widow and two children are left. Mrs. Huffman has many friends in this vicinity, who will deeply sympathize with her in her sad loss. Deceased was about forty-eight years of age, and well known in Bath and vicinity. A sister, Mrs. A. Hitchins, resides on Amherst Island.

The Rathbun company's drive logs are passing through Napanee a month earlier than last year. Yesterday was quite sultry, but a nice breeze was blowing which made it more comfortable. The two previous days, the weather seems to have settled and more cheerful reports come from the farmers who were beginning to cry too much rain.

The first strawberries of the season were on the market, yesterday, and readily sold at a good price, and not half enough to supply the demand. If the bright warm weather continues there will be quite a lot on Saturday.

Answering The War Call.

Rev. J. G. Waller, Canadian missionary, has written "The War keeps on robbing us of our young people. In one week four church Christians left Napanee. One was a woman who two years before became the wife of one of our Christian leaders in Napanee Middle school. She had been a Red Cross nurse, but with her marriage thought that her connection with the society ceased; but suddenly an order came to her to present herself for duty at the military hospital in Osaka. She handed her five-month-old baby to another woman's care, and went bravely away, but our hearts ached for her. Of all the hundreds that, in the last year, I have seen to express any sorrow when ordered out, and she had a good excuse for her grief."
