Russian Cavalry Parlayzed By Japanese Infantry.

SAYS TOKIO, AND THE WAR WILL CONTINUE.

Retreat, Cut Off-Japanese Advance Pauses, After Clearing Immediate Front-Linevitch Still in Retreat. necial to the Whig.

St. Petersburg, June 23.-News from the battlefield is exceedingly meagre. A press telegram, of Tuesday's date, speaks of a "rear guard action," and there are rumors that the Russian Nicholas has definitely army is retreating. But the latest despatches received from Gen. Linevitch, bearing the same date, declared briefly that the Japanese advance has paused. A despatch from Gunshu pass, of Wednesday's date, says that the operations of the Japanese ended after the last fight, and that the Japanese appear to have been merely clearing their immediate front.

Heavy Rains And Mists. Tokio, June, 23.-Heavy rains mists are hindering the operations Manchuria. It is difficult to see far afield while the plains are flooded, and the roads almost impassable for heavy transport. The Russians are advance ing. The war office, here, notified the commanders that the continuance of the war is not affected by the peace proposals, and say peace is remote, and that the war will continue. The steamer Anacona, from Hongkong, for Yokohoma, with rice, is missing. It is suspected that she has been captured by a Russian cruiser.

Russian Cavalry Paralyzed. London, June 23.-A despatch he Telegraph, from Tokio, says that Gen. Mistchenko's Cossacks have been paralyzed by their bitter experience with the Japanese infantry. Despite the reinforcements they have received they will not approach within 'range the Japanese. One detachment which was unable to retreat in a re cent engagement, has been completely cut off. Gen.
