Kitchener now gets a free hand to carry out his scheme, which is based on considerations of danger from a Russian attack. His plan involves among other changes, an increase of £2,500,000 in the existing expenditure, to £20,500, 000, and the raising of the field army from 80,000 to 140,000 men. Gen. Kftchener's despatches are characterized by sharp criticism. He says the present system is inefficient, being framed mainly to meet peace requirements, while the fact that an army exists for war has been overlooked. The only continuity of policy that has been maintained is that of making it easy to stand still and extremely difficult to move forward, "Nobody," he adds, 'dislikes change more than I do, but if it is necessary I do not fear it. I certainly would not continue a rotten system because I was afraid to stretch out my hand to take a sound one." He concluded by adjudging the Indian administrators to follow the example of Japan, not Russia.
