## NOBLE CHARITIES

### CANON FLEMING PRAISES DR. BARNARDO.

Is Greatest Charity Organizer World Has Known—\$7,000 Boys and Girls Rescued in Forty Years of Work.

A recent sermon of Canon Fleming, of London, chaplain to the king, paid tribute to the work of Dr. Barnardo, the greatest organizer of charities the world has known. Forty years of his work will be completed next month, during which he has sustained an open door for the friendless, the destitute and the endangered young life—has extended the arms of mercy, care, love, grace and saving. Over 57,000 boys and girls have been rescued or re-educative, clothed, trained, started in life; 16,225 have been placed in Canada, Australia or South Africa, and 95 per cent. have been successful and above moral complaint. The outcome is marvellous, truly providential; no institution in the world can rival it. Sometimes in Canada an immigrant lad accused of crime will be described in print as a Barnardo lad. In nine cases out of ten it is a libel on the philanthropist, the term Barnardo being used in a general sense to describe all comers. The Barnardo boy or girl is very rarely amenable to public complaint.

These walls' homes contain now \$330, the incomes still exceeding the number of those placed out. The table cost each day is \$240 or £10 per hour; means for this and other expenditures, £190,000 per year, come chiefly from voluntary gifts, so spontaneous that it is not known a day ahead what is in store for the managers. The faith which built up and continues this work is remarkable. There are 140,000 givers yearly. This year it is proposed to send forth to the colonies 500 boys and girls. A cost of £10 each for outfit and passage. The first party embraced 365 boys, and before they left London for Canada they attended a mission for one week, under Rev. Norman Bennett; the closing meeting, to a rally under O. M. Alexander, the noted evangelist. The second party was composed of 150 girls. It is hoped to emigrate 1,500 this year, and yet in spite of the output the number of dependent children increased 1,169 last year. The average cost of support is £16 per inmate. The admissions in 1904 numbered 3,827, and in that year 1,265 were sent abroad. Eight cottages were added last year to the village home at cost of \$9,000. Next month cottages will be opened three months, all being gifts of those who applied and second a truly good and great benevolent enterprise.

And there are others. The annual convention of the National Florence Chittenden mission, at Detroit, has called to notice this broad benevolent institution. Charles N. Chittenden, its founder and leader for twenty-two years, opened the parent mission, New York city soon after the death of his favorite daughter and as a memorial. Now in sixty-five rescue homes 3,000 children are trained to the highest of housework or trades and the children brought up with scrupulous care.

Besides the work in the United States their homes are sustained at Marseilles, France; Tokyo, Japan; Mexico City, and Shanghai, China.

## VALUE OF THE SILO.

### Money Maker Farmer is Slow to Appreciate.

A. W. Trow, president of the Minnesota State Dairy Association, and one of the most enthusiastic dairy men in his state, spoke on the "Value of the Silo" at the recent Iowa dairy convention. He believes that Iowa farmers need much more instruction in the matter of cheaper feeds and better methods in dairying. The time has gone by when Iowa and Minnesota farms can be operated as they were in the early days. A farmer must raise an abundance of his own feed. Clover and corn fodder can be grown anywhere in Iowa and are splendid rations. There is nearly as much feed in the stalk as in the ear of corn, and the silo is a preservative of both the corn and the ear. It is a money-maker for the farmer, although he is slow to see this and still eager to put his money into this device.

To fill Mr. Trow's silo, which is eighteen feet in diameter, thirty-two feet in height and holds 160 tons, the following tools are required. One man and four horses to cut the corn, five or six men and teams with wagons to haul to cutter, one man to feed the machine and one man in the silo. Mr. Trow usually fills his silo in about ten days with this amount of help. He lets it settle and then finishes filling in about ten days.

Mr. Griswold, a prominent farmer near Lacrosse, Wis., was visited by Mr. Trow recently. He has a farm of fifty acres, on which he keeps twenty-eight cows and twenty head of young stock and horses. The total revenue from this farm is \$3,000. Mr. Griswold has two silos—one for summer and one for winter—and in recent years has been able to raise the average product of his cows from 242 to 442 pounds of butter per year.

Mr. Trow recommends planting corn for the silo north and south and planting about twice as thick as you would for husking on the richest piece of ground on your farm. He advises using the same sort of corn you would plant for your ordinary field corn. He says it is not well to begin to fill the silo when the corn is in green.

### HANDLING MILK.

Some of the Things That Must Be Avoided. Diphtheria, tuberculosis, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, cholera, choleraic disturbances and sore throat epidemics have all been traced not infrequently to milk supplies. Those milking or taking care of the milk are generally at fault, for such individuals may be suffering from the disease or may be in communication with some one who has the disease. Accordingly a means of conveyance is provided. Therefore those having communicable diseases should neither milk nor handle milk which is consumed by the public.

Perhaps one of the most common sources of impure milk, although it is not usually admitted, is the polluted condition of the utensils which are employed in the care of milk. From 500,000 to 50,000,000 germs have been counted in each gram of dirt taken from the creases in a milk pail, while from its surface have been taken many thousands per square inch.

In order to have the perfect motion of the bowl the separator must be set level and be kept clean and well oiled, says Professor Webster, chief of the dairy division department of agriculture. The oil should be thin or light, so that it will not gum the wearing parts. A heavy oil will make the machine run hard and will gum quickly on small, high speed bearings. All the bearings of the machine should be frequently flushed with coal oil. It is well to make a run about once in two or three weeks, using coal oil on all the bearings. This keeps the parts free from gum and washer out grit or sand that may have blown into them. It is an excellent plan to have a cover of closely woven cloth or oilcloth that can be kept over the machine while it is not in operation.
