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PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT. Allowed to Select Russia's Plenipotentiaries. Washington, June 27.—Russia has given reassurance of conditions in the peace negotiations by placing President Roosevelt in possession of the tentative expression of her plenipotentiaries as follows:

London, June 27.—A cablegram from the St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times says: "It is reported that the government has decided to allow a third crack on the Finnish rail-road, with a view to a possible ability of the arrival of the Japanese fleet in the Baltic, where it could easily form a naval base in the Alanda straits, and blockade the whole Baltic coast, leaving only one serviceable battleship left."

Cher's Troops Evade Attack. St. Petersburg, June 27.—Two telegrams were received yesterday by Finance Minister Witte from Lieut.-Gen. Linvitch, dated June 24th and June 25th, respectively, referring to the movements of June 21st and June 22nd.

Commanders Sorry. Gushu Pass, Manchuria, June 27.—Vague dispatches reaching here by the official papers, edited for the army, make the conditions under which the proposed peace is to be reached indifferently understood.

Warships Ordered Home. Hong Kong, June 27.—The South China Morning Post states that the British warships, Glory, Hogue, and Sully have been suddenly ordered to return to England. It is believed that the large diminution of the British fleet in China waters, lately, is connected with the European situation.

Get Word To Join Colors. St. Petersburg, June 27.—The French army reserve men living in Russia are reported to have received notice to join the colors.

Fears Sudden Attack. London, June 27.—The Brussels correspondent of the Daily Mail says that France, fearing a sudden German attack, through Belgium, has warned the German minister in Paris, of the necessity for making effective fortifications along the river Meuse and at Antwerp.
