## THE BUGLE SOUNDS

### WHAT IS HEARD IN MILITARY CIRCLES.

Gen. Lake to Be Here Soon—  
Would Like to Have the  
Central Camp Located Here—  
Grounds Available.

At the tented village over the bay  
things have commenced to run  
smoothly and the men are settling  
down to drill. The camp, if things  
keep on as they are at present, will  
be one of the best ever held. The  
men are better than and more eager  
in the performance of their duties  
than go under canvas as a rule. In  
fact recruiting was a volunteer act on  
the part of the men for training and  
the officers had not to skimp about  
their hold nearly as much as the old  
soldiers to fill their ranks. This  
year the men came looking to join  
and had not to be coaxed in as of  
late summers. The artillery is situated  
on the left hand side of the road  
as one approaches the camp. Then  
comes the Army Service Corps, the  
staff, and the several infantry regiments.  
The Army Medical Corps are on  
the rising ground nearest the  
road between the main lines.  
Out at the right hand side the  
cavalry is encamped. The whole  
organization is complete in details and  
Col. Gordon, D.O.C., has succeeded in  
making, during his first year under  
canvas as commander of the rural  
corps of this district, a camp which  
promises to be a model one in every  
particular. The orders for the day  
contain the following announcements:  
Divisional field officer of the day  
to-morrow from the 7th Infantry  
brigade. Next for duty from the 6th  
infantry brigade.

The medical officer of the day to-  
morrow, Maj. Young, 3rd Dragoons.  
Next for duty, Capt. H. H. Alger,  
49th Regiment.

Veterinary officer of the day to-  
morrow, Capt. Morgan, 5th Field  
Battalion.

Duty band to-morrow from the 7th  
Infantry Brigade. Next for duty, from  
the 6th Infantry Brigade.

Main guard to-morrow from the 7th  
Infantry Brigade. Next for duty, from  
the 6th Infantry Brigade.

It is proposed to hold a series of  
inter-regimental brigade baseball and  
football matches in camp. Prof.  
Percy Holmes, physical director, Y.  
M.C.A., Peterson, will have charge  
of these matches. Brigade commanders  
will please assist Mr. Holmes in the  
above, as much as possible.

A bugler will sound the dismissal for  
all drills at 4:30 a.m. of each day.  
Regiments are not to be dismissed  
from parade until the bugle sounds.

The armourer sergeant will com-  
mence the inspection of the small  
arms to-morrow, commencing with  
the cavalry brigade at 8:30 a.m. He  
will notify the brigadiers of the sev-  
eral brigades and C.O.'s of departmental  
corps, when he will be able to  
inspect the small arms of the different  
regiments in camp.

Six men will be detailed for each  
infantry brigade to act as markers  
at the butts and will report to the  
musketry instructor at divisional  
headquarters at 8:30 a.m. on the  
29th.

Corpl. P. L. O'Neill, R.C.D., is at-  
tached to 2nd cavalry brigade from  
the 27th inst.
