### FIRING ON IT

### The Town Of Odessa Under Bombardment.

### SQUADRON IS LATE

### GOVERNMENT TRANSPORT CREW HAS MUTINIED.

### Martial Law Has Been Successfully Imposed in the Town—The Mutineers Are Said to be Without Ammunition—Crews Said to be Untrustworthy.

Special to the Whig. Odessa, June 30.—The Odessa correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, in a despatch, filed at 11.29 o'clock on Thursday night, says that the Kniz Potemkin is firing on the town, and that Admiral Kruger's squadron is not in sight.

The Squadron Delayed. St. Petersburg, June 30.—A despatch received early this morning, from Sebastopol, announced that a squadron of battleships, the Triviatliella, Simope, and Rostislav, with a cruiser and several torpedo boats started for Odessa at eight o'clock last evening. This explains the non-appearance of the squadron at Odessa, but it is difficult to conjecture the reason for delaying departure two days at such a critical juncture.

Calling For Warships. Odessa, June 30.—The crew of a government transport which arrived here, yesterday, from Nikolief, mutinied, seized their officers and joined the crew of the battleship Kniz Potemkin, to whom they turned over the captain and other officers of the transport. It is reported that the foreign consuls have applied to their respective governments to send warships to Odessa. It will be most difficult to describe the exact situation here. The Kniz Potemkin lies off the harbor but at the time of writing started to be not molested the town, nor have the mutineers aided the rioters to the extent of repulsing the troops, or inducing the latter to join the revolt.

Martial law, thus far, has been effectively imposed. It is impossible to reach the scenes of the fighting. Any attempt to pass the soldiers who guard the approaches to the harbor involves instant death. The inactivity of the mutineers is ascribed in some quarters to the reason of no ammunition. The rumor, in at least plausible inasmuch as it has been said that the Black Sea fleet was denied of ammunition to supply the Baltic fleet.

Untrustworthy Crews. London, June 30.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times says, according to the latest advices from Sebastopol, only two of Admiral Kruger's ships sailed for Odessa, the crews of the others being considered untrustworthy. Admiral Chukhin has hurriedly left St. Petersburg to resume command of the Black Sea fleet. Summary powers to quell the revolt have been given him. The most serious censorship is exercised over Odessa. Telegrams, even the newspapers are not aware of what has happened.

Troubles Elsewhere. St. Petersburg, June 30.—It is reported that the troops started to quell the revolt of the sailors at the imperial navy, at Libau, and succeeded, after severe fighting, in repulsing the mutineers, who, however, escaped with their arms. There is an unfavourable report that is similar to that at Libau, has broken out at Revel.

Official circles, especially the department of police, believe that outbreaks were planned by revolutionists and are manifestly in the hands of the army shared by the higher social circles of the capital.

Fire Upon Odessa. London, June 30.—The Daily Mail, this morning, prints the following from its Odessa correspondent, time from 10.30 o'clock, Thursday night: "Using full charges, the Kniz Potemkin opened fire on the city to-night. Large bodies of troops have arrived. It is reported that there are altogether 10,000 troops in Odessa. The Kniz Potemkin a tugboat flying the Red Cross flag proceeded to the opposite side of the bay and reported that two warships were lying opposite a little fountain at the harbor end of one of the main streets."

A Cruiser Burned. St. Petersburg, June 30.—It is reported that the volunteer fleet cruiser Saratoff has been burned at Odessa. Admiral Kruger's squadron is expected to arrive at Odessa to-night. His orders are to surrender, and on refusal to sink her, after which he is to assist in restoring order in the town.

The emperor has issued the following ukase addressed to the ruling senate: "In order to guarantee public safety and to determine the disorders at Odessa and neighboring localities we have found it necessary to declare a state of war in Odessa and districts to invest the commander of the troops in the military district of Odessa with the rights of military authority and special rights of civil administration for the defence of order and public tranquillity."

### An Italian Row at Port Arthur, Ont.

London, June 30.—The official Gazette publishes a list of the honors bestowed on the occasion of the king's birthday, to-day. Prince Arisugawa, of the Japanese imperial house, now in Europe, is made an honorary member of the military division of the first class of the Order of the Bath.

The following appointments are made to the Order of Merit: Field-Marshal Sir George White, Admiral Sir John Fisher, R. C. Tebb, Sir Lawrence Alma-Tadema, George Meredith, and William Holman Hunt.

Admiral Baton von Spann, of the Austrian navy, and Admiral Fournier, of the French navy, are made Knights of the Order of St. Michael and St. George. The latter receives the honor for his services in connection with the St. Louis exposition.

Baron de Courcel, Francois Gregh, and Richard Marks, are appointed companions of the same order for their services in connection with the Dogger Bank commission.

Prince Louis of Battenberg and Col. Watson are appointed Knights Commanders of the Order of St. Michael and St. George. The latter receives the honor for his services in connection with the St. Louis exposition.
