**AN OFFICIAL EVENT**

**CELEBRATION OF THE KING'S BIRTHDAY.**

The Demonstration Limited to the British Isles—"Trooping the Colors" on the Horse Guards Parade.

London, June 30.—King Edward's birthday was officially celebrated today. The king's real birthday is on November 9th, as everybody is away from London at that time of year, scattered at the shooting lodges in Scotland, at country houses in England, or else on the continent, another date is always selected by him for the celebration of his birthday during the London season. To-day's celebration, however, was limited to the British Isles. In all parts of the empire the day is celebrated on the actual anniversary.

The genuine affection with which the British people regard their sovereign was evidenced as always in the keeping of a general holiday and the suspension of business. The towns throughout the kingdom were gaily decorated and the shipping at the various ports made a liberal display of bunting. The day was observed at all the home military and naval stations with parades and salutes.

The chief feature of the London celebration was the ceremony of "trooping the colors" on the Horse Guards parade. Thousands of persons lined the Whitehall route and cheered his majesty as the royal procession passed on its way from Buckingham Palace to scene of the ceremony. Stands covered with crimson cloth were erected about the parade ground and were occupied by thousands of privileged spectators, including the new United States ambassador, Whitelaw Reid, his wife and daughter. The king was greeted with loud applause as he made his appearance with a brilliant escort that included many notables. The troops taking part in the ceremonies were the Grenadier Guards, Scots Guards, Irish Guards and the Life Guards. After an inspection of the troops and presentation of the colors, the ceremonies ended with a review of all the troops on the ground.

Allan Lemmon afforded much pleasure in his vocal efforts. A sketch by Miss Sherring and William McFriedge created great amusement.

The 11th Band was in attendance and made the interval between the vocal numbers enjoyable. Miss May Newman, the organist of the church, rendered a piano solo which met with applause and the varied proceedings were brought to a close by a superhuman effort on the part of J. Saunders, and if a laugh is worth a penny, every one present is indebted to Mr. Saunders for a considerable extent as he had to respond three times.

**Irish Woman and Three Children Were Deported.**

An Irish woman and her three children, who have just arrived from the Emerald Isle, took the steamer American, en route to Syracuse, N.Y., to join her husband and brother who are at work there, but the little Irish family was refused admittance to the "land of the free" by Immigration Inspector Lewis. Homeless and friendless the little Irish family arrived in Kingston last evening. On hearing their sad story a collection was taken up by people on Folger's wharf, and the mother and her children taken to the Grand Union Hotel. They had tickets through to Syracuse and just a dollar in cash, so Inspector Lewis' action forced the family to be dependent upon Canadian charity, when it would have been under a husband and father's care had it been allowed to proceed to Syracuse and not adrift. This morning the woman appealed to the House of Providence to assist her in getting to her husband. It seems she has all the necessary papers and United States Consul Twitchell is giving her a note to the inspector, so that she can resume her journey this afternoon.

The need of a United States immigration inspector at Kingston is becoming greater every day. People from the Old Country going across the border would be saved much trouble and inconvenience if the inspector was stationed here instead of at Cape Vincent. Inspector Conway used to make Kingston his headquarters.

**HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS**

Any free numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Territories, excepting 1 and 20, which has not been homesteaded, or reserved to provide wood lots for settlers, or for other purposes, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the owner of land, or of a lease, or of any part of the land to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

**ENTRY**

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the Local Agent for the District in which the land is situated, receive authority for some one to make entry for him. A fee of \$10 is charged for a homestead entry.

**HOMESTEAD DUTIES**

A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required by the provisions of the Dominion Lands Act, and the amendments thereto, to perform the conditions connected therewith, under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years. It is the practice of the Department to require a settler to bring 15 acres under cultivation, but if he prefers he may substitute stock; and 20 head of cattle, to be actually his own property, with buildings for their accommodation, will be accepted instead of the cultivation.

(2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased, of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this act, resides upon the farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of this act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing on the father or mother.

(3) If a settler was entitled to and has obtained entry for a second homestead the requirements of this act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by residence upon the first homestead, if the second homestead is in the vicinity of the first homestead.

(4) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, and has besides 50 acres substantially fenced, he may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. The term "vicinity" used above in respect to the land to be taken, or in respect to the adjoining townships, a settler who avails himself of the provisions of Clause (3), (3) or (4) must cultivate 30 acres of his homestead, or substitute 20 head of stock, with buildings for their accommodation, and have besides 50 acres substantially fenced. The provisions of a second entry is restricted by law to those settlers only who completed the duties upon the first homestead, and file their patent on or before the 2nd June, 1889. Every homesteader who fails to comply with the requirements of the homestead law is liable to have his entry cancelled, and the land may be again thrown open for entry.

**APPLICATION FOR PATENT**

Should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector, before making application for patent, the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of his intention to do so.

**INFORMATION**

Newly arrived immigrants will receive at the Immigration Office in Winnipeg or at any Dominion Lands Office in Manitoba or the North-West Territories, information as to the lands that are open for entry, and from the officers in charge of free expenses, advice and assistance in securing lands to suit them. Full information respecting the land, timber, soil and mineral laws, as well as respecting Dominion Lands in the Railway Belt in British Columbia, may be obtained on application to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa; the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, Manitoba; or to any of the Dominion Lands Agents in Manitoba or the North-West Territories.
