London, July 1.-A despatch to the Daily Mail, dated Odessa, 12.35 a.m. "It was at first reported by the authorities that the Kniaz Potemkine Taveritchesky had surrendered unconditionally, but it is now confirmed that the mutinous warships have been joined by the battleships George I and Pobedonesteff, the officers of which are prisoners. The vessels are anchored in the soads and are using their searchlights vigorously as if expecting an attack from the rest of the fleet, which s about fifteen miles distant. One of the searchlights of the latter is visible. The information of this second mutiny comes from an absolutely re-

liable authority." A despatch to the Times from St Petersburg, time 11.55 p.m., says it is reported that telegrams have just been received announcing that a battle is in progress outside of Odessa. It is said that several of Admiral Kruger's ships have joined the mutineers. The latest news from Kronstadt is that two officers were killed and six la

St. Petersburg, July 1.-A strike of 8,000 imperial sailors together with workmen in the yards of the national port at Kronstadt occurred, yesterday, and one officer was killed. The sailors soon yielded but the workmen continue on strike.

Cronstadt is the nearest seaport to St. Petersburg, being within a short distance of Russian capital. W It is situated at the extreme eastern end of the Gulf of Finland, and during the depth of winter is inaccessible.
