



The committee decided to again offer the power at the cost of labor and material, the amount per kilo-watt for a half holiday on Fridays for the hour, to be not more than 1.66 cents. Last fall it was proposed to charge two cents per kilo-watt hour. The rate paid by the railway previously was 1.30 cents, without the heaters, so that the new rate will be one-third cent higher. If it is found that power can be supplied a little cheaper, the amount will be reduced. It is difficult to fix a definite amount by a mere estimate.
