A PEACE MISSION M. MURAVIEFF IS THE RUSSIAN CHIEF.

COMMERCIAL MATTERS. An Armistice is to Be Arranged by the Heads of the Armies in Manchuria—All Operations Have Ceased.



M. MURAVIEFF. Social to the Whig. Paris, July 1.—A despatch to the Echo de Paris, from St. Petersburg, states that M. Muravieff, formerly minister of justice and later Russian ambassador of Italy, has been selected as the chief of the peace mission in Manchuria. Nelloff having refused to accept.

Operations Ceased. St. Petersburg, July 1.—The news from the front indicates that the military operations have suddenly come to a standstill.

May Be An Armistice. Washington, July 1.—It is understood here, on good authority, that negotiations are in progress in Manchuria for an armistice which is believed will be drawn up by Gen. Liner and the Japanese. The plan is for the plenipotentiaries to be announced, but should the negotiations for the armistice fail to indicate an early plenipotentiaries may be made in the near future.

Urged to Revolt. St. Petersburg, July 1.—Serious disturbances are reported from the province of Kurak in the southern part of European Russia. Prisoners returning from Japan have stirred up the people of the district by their tales of revolt against the continuance of the war and to oppose the government. Troops have been called out but they have been unable to curb the aroused people.

Gruesome Barque Discovered on Lonely Shore.

A gruesome maritime discovery is reported by the Chilian Times, Valparaiso, which may clear up a mystery of a missing British ship. This journal reports that an expedition, which has proceeded to the Island of Guaflo, on the South American coast, discovered on the shore the skeletons and many boxes of cargo. One of the spars of the ship bore the inscription, "Castleton, New Brunswick." This is probably one of the fleet of Messrs. T. Benyon & Co., which trades between the Bristol Channel and the west coast of South America. She left Port Talbot early in April, and had not since been heard of.

NEWS OF THE WORLD

Matters That Interest Everybody. Notes From All Over—Little Of Everything Easily Read And Remembered.

A cable announces that the Australian government has been defeated.

The C.N.R. and the G.T.P. are coming to terms in the matter of terminals in Winnipeg.

Eight Manchurian towns have just been opened up to trade and travel by the Japanese.

It is said that Viceroy Curzon and Gen. Kitchener are in complete accord regarding the administrative forces in India.

The Russian battleship Perovskii, which was sunk at Port Arthur, was successfully floated by the Japanese yesterday.

May Hope Young, charged with the murder of her infant child at Digby, N.S., has made a confession to Detective Power, Halifax.

O. Beaudoin, Sherbrooke, was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary on a charge of breaking into the store of J. Normandin.

Hon. Mr. Fielding has given notice of a resolution fixing the salaries of the governors of the new provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan at \$8,000.

Bennie Moran, aged twenty-three, seaman, a native of Sturgeon Falls, Ont., died in Halifax, N.S., hospital as the result of picking his ear with a rusty nail.

The sons of two Canadian judges, one a son of Justice Curbridge, of the Quebec court of Canada, and the other the oldest son of county Judge Locke, of Winnipeg, were called to the bar of Manitoba.

The new law compelling all firms which do not have Canadian plants to pay a license of \$300 if they wish to do business in the province of Quebec, is creating consternation in the New England States.

Emperor William has promoted Admiral von Krosener to be grand admiral of the German fleet. Von Krosener has long held high commands, and had the complete confidence of the government as an exceptional administrator.

Cost Of Automobiles. In the Country Calendar for July, Herbert L. Towle, the motor expert, writes: "The standard price of a two-passenger automobile is \$870. If of present-day construction, its life might be estimated at 24,000 miles. The depreciation of a well-kept runabout in this line at the end of the second year it would probably sell for \$300, with sundry lamps, spare tubes, etc., thrown in. Its mileage has been, perhaps, 5,000 miles in two years, and the repair bill may have been two per cent. of its purchase price per thousand miles, including the repair man's time on all jobs which the owner or his handy man have not personally attended to. Thus, if as is likely, the car changes hands at the end of its second year, we have for the first two years an annual depreciation of nearly or quite \$200, and an estimated annual repair bill of \$82. The latter would include painting and a thorough overhauling before disposing of the car. Other items are: Tires, at two cents per mile, \$80; gasoline, at one cent per mile, \$40; oil, batteries and small supplies, \$15; stable on premises \$20; insurance (fire), \$20; total, \$47, for 4,000 miles, or 10.7 cents per mile."

A Fearful Warning. A man too economical to take a paper sent his little boy to borrow the copy taken by his neighbor. His haste the boy ran over a stand of bees, and in ten minutes looked like a warty man whose face had been stung by his father who ran to his assistance, and falling to notice his wife's fierce, ran into that, breaking it down, cutting a handful of flesh from his anatomy and ruining a four dollar pair of pants. The boy took advantage of the gap in his old coat and got into the cornfield and killed her self eating green corn. Hearing the racket the wife ran out upsetting a bucket of water on the fence and the whole flock in the hurry she dropped a 37 cent loaf of false teeth. The baby, left alone, crawled through the spilled cream and into the parlor, raising a brand new \$20 carpet. During the excitement the oldest daughter ran away with the hired man; the dog broke up four setting hens, and the calves got out and ate four fine shirts.

The Terrible Plague. The plague is claiming four victims in India, but the returns for the week ending June 1st showed 23,033 deaths. The most serious feature of the reports is that the disease is assuming a new and more terrible form. Several cases have occurred in which people apparently in good health have died within a few minutes. At Raigoon an English clerk in the railway stores office, who had no signs of illness when he got up in the morning, fell down dead in his bath-room. A correspondent at Aligarh, United Provinces, reports five cases in which men walking in the streets had dropped dead. The efforts of the government to check the pestilence by inoculation are still hampered by popular ignorance, but the wholesale destruction of rats, by which the infection is carried about, is being actively prosecuted.
