LAZINESS, IGNORANCE IN RUSSIAN ARMY.

Telephones Wires Used for Shoes

Laces--No Electrician to Repair Dynamos--Shells Ranged--Too Much Trouble to Clean Screens, so Took Them Out.

A Russian gas official's living costs miserably small, and the officials are driven to dishonesty. Some months ago, when Grand Duke Sergius Michaelovitch became head of the artillery committee, several members were given pensions of from ten to fifteen roubles by Krupp to give the orders for new guns to his establishment, besides receiving their usual every shell made for Russia was mortgaged, for from six to nine roubles, paid to the czar's officers, and that the manufacturers might make their usual profit the quality of the shells had to suffer.

The admiralty paid on an average fifty roubles (\$25) a ton for coal for the fleet to their contract they were to deliver Cardiff coal, but instead they gave Swansea or Australian coal, the heating capacity of which is only half of the Cardiff coal, and which makes an enormous smoke, so that it would have been absolutely impossible for the fleet to have sailed, so the admiralty had to be content with a dense cloud of smoke within a radius of ten miles and those of his ships which had been designed to make ten miles could only make six, though burning immense quantities of coal.

At Madagascar Rojstevsky had to get new dynamo for many of his ships, because they did not have an electrician who knew how to repair them when they were the least out of order. His men were all ignorant, and he had neither good mechanics nor stokers.

A story is told of a Russian battleship which, though designed to steam sixteen knots, refused to make more than nine, and the admiralty made a strong complaint to the firm which had built it. The firm found that the chief engineer of the ship had removed the screens intended to distribute the flames through the tubular Belleville boilers, because it was too much trouble to clean them, with the result that the flames heated only one part of the boiler where a number of the tubes had been overheated and ruined. This is everywhere in the Russian army and navy--ignorance, neglect, and laziness. A letter from an officer at the front complains that the soldiers cut the military telegraph and telephone wires to tie their shoes to their feet, and that he has not found one non-commissioned officer able to understand a map or recognize the uniforms of the enemy.
