**INFORMATION THAT IS PROFITABLE.**

**Futility of Attempting to Kill Out Dandelions—Great Profit on Eggs—Value of Carload of Wood at Present Prices.**

A very great and promising wheat harvest is looming up for Kansas provided the weather is favourable during the ripening and harvesting period. It is always a bad mistake to sell the good-breed mare from the farm, for she is always worth to the man who owns her not less than \$2 per pound.

When a dog once gets the sheep-killing habit he can never be reformed, and the sooner he is killed the better. The fear that was quite general on the part of the smaller towns that if trolley lines were constructed between them and the larger towns, it would prove detrimental to the business interest of the smaller town, is proving to have no justification, the common result being that the business of both towns is stimulated and benefited. Opportunity to do business always gets more business.

An easy way to fertilize the rose-bushes is to dip up a few pails of the enriched water which will stand in a barnyard after a heavy rain and put it on the rose bed. The bushes will respond to this sort of treatment with larger and more blossoms.

It is all right to go for dandelions every spring, for they make a healthful and palatable dish of greens, but we do not believe, all that were ever dug ever limited their production one particle. The seed of this plant is so profuse and so easily distributed that the effort to destroy it by digging it up is like trying to bale out the ocean with a tin cup.

The mere matter of uniformity of size and color of the eggs from a flock of pedigreed chickens is itself a sufficient reward for all the trouble taken to secure such a flock. The egg money received from the poultry on the farm compares with it the largest margin of profit of any money got out of the farm.

A car load of wool sells for about \$7,000 to-day. A grove of wild crab apple trees in full bloom, just a prospect of nature, is about as fine a combination of bloom, beauty and fragrance as anything the most skilled botanist could devise.

Straw corn has a slightly higher feeding value than field corn and is more reliable by all stock when fed in the bundle or in a green state. It is for the dairy cow the choicest sort of corn.

Better roads and no higher rate of taxation come with the introduction of the new method of working the earth roads, and this is just what all the people want.

Larger and better tomatoes can always be grown when the vines are rigorously pruned. It is always a poor policy to let a tomato vine spread itself over a space ten feet square. We are asked whether bees are really indispensable in the process of fertilizing the bloom on fruit trees. Probably not wholly. The winds and many kinds of insect life have a part in the work, but the bee no doubt is one of the principle agents in securing a perfect fertilization. Bees and orchards always go well together.

If your credit is good at the bank \$200 and you have thirty head of stock to carry through next winter, it will pay you to borrow the money and build a silo. You can more than half pay for a silo the first year by utilizing your heretofore wasted corn fodder and selling your hay.

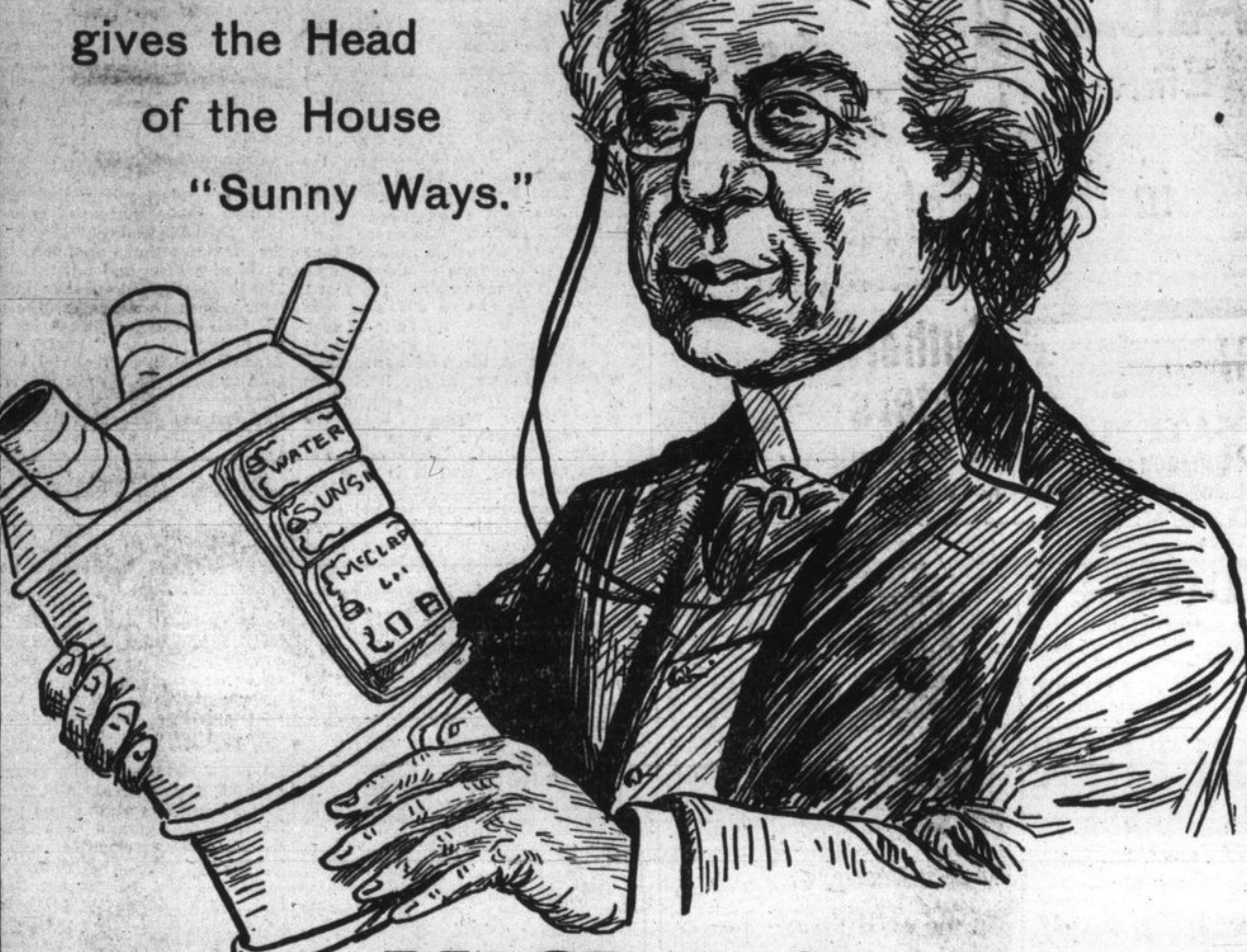
