THE MIKADO'S VOICE

IS FOR WAR'S END—MAKE CERTAIN PEACE.

Japanese Averse to Conflict

Reluctant to Begin Hostilities and Ready to Accept Termination of Struggle if It Can Be Arranged.

Tokio, July 7.—The emperor delivered an address yesterday to the peace plenipotentiaries as follows:

"The president of the United States, being grievously that the war between Russia and Japan had not been brought to a close after the lapse of more than a year and being impressed with the urgent need in the interests of peace and humanity of terminating the conflict, has suggested that the two governments appoint plenipotentiaries and cause them to meet together to negotiate peace.

"We were compelled contrary to our expectations, to resort to arms despite our constant availing wish for peace, and in consequence of the compulsory spirit of our opposition hostilities could be brought to an end nothing would be more satisfactory than such consummation.

"Accordingly, we at once accepted the suggestion of the president of the United States, and we hereby charge you with the mission of negotiating and concluding peace.

"You should devote yourselves with all of your power and energy to our mission and make every effort to cause the re-establishment of peace on a durable basis."

PROPOSE TO DETHRONE CZAR

And Establish Democracy at Moscow.

Berlin, July 7.—The Vostschek Zeitung says that at a conference of representatives of the revolutionary groups of Russia, at Moscow, the proposal was made to issue a proclamation announcing the dethronement of the czar, and the establishment of a democratic government, with Moscow as the capital.

THE BUDGET SPEECH

A GENERAL TARIFF REVISION NEXT YEAR.

Canadian Credit is Excellent—Practically No Increase of Debt Since 1896.

Ottawa, July 6.—The budget for 1905, as delivered by Hon. Mr. Fielding, this afternoon, was remarkable for its lack of surprises and for the brevity of debate which followed, and was completed this evening. Mr. Fielding's speech was itself brief, in keeping with the drowsy atmosphere of the house and the general desire to close up the business of the session. The government took the ground that, in view of the coming investigation by a tariff commission, only urgent changes would be made in the tariff. It was announced that the commission would make a thorough tour of Canada and endeavor to report in time for next year's session and frame a tariff on what is known as the maximum and minimum system.

The following changes were announced in the tariff by Mr. Fielding: Reduced duty of 60c per hundred pounds on dry white sugar, raised from 5 to 30 per cent; white lead produced in oil, increased from 25 to 35 per cent; cement, 25 per cent; all values imposed on bags containing cement; winter flour; Scotch Aspric; 25c per gallon, to meet the duty on French light wines.

The settlers' effects enactment was made more strict to exclude goods for sale and export of gold mining machinery will be continued on the free list till July 1st, 1906. Molasses imported from the British West Indies, via Newfoundland, are to be treated as direct importations.

The general conditions of Canada's finances, as described by Mr. Fielding reflected the growth of the expenditure to meet the large needs of the dominion's development and the failure of revenue to quite keep pace. There was a surplus of \$9,000,000 of ordinary revenue over ordinary expenditure during the year just closed, but, counting the capital expenditure, the minister of finance estimated an addition of \$1,250,000 to the debt on the year's transactions. Mr. Fielding emphasized the necessity for caution in expenditure, but repeated the familiar doctrine that "wise expenditure is true economy." The new Transcontinental railway would involve large expenditures for the next few years, but he believed the house and the country would expect the road to be pushed with all possible energy.

Mr. Foster's reply was directed as a warning to the government against incurring further heavy expenditures while the revenue was practically stationary, especially in view of the fact that they would have shortly to meet heavy loans and borrow largely for the construction of the new railway. Mr. Foster's speech was marked by good natural delivery, but his voice was not strong, and effort lost some of its effect on that account. Other speakers in the debate were Messrs. Cackshatt, Clements, Galhiser and Daniel.

A Dismal Tornado.

Fort Worth, Tex., July 7.—A tornado struck the upper edge of Montague county, killing forty, injuring a large number, and doing untold damage to cattle and crops. At Nevada there are six dead, while families being wiped out by the path of the cyclone was over rich farming country.
