To Hinge On Indemnity. London, July 18.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Standard says there are reasons to believe that the peace negotiations will hinge on the amount of the indemnity to be paid to Japan by Russia. The minister of finance, M. De Witte, is now studying the question, and will supply the amount when it is fixed, and also the funds for the re-establishment of the government after the war. The correspondent claims to know that two financial syndicates have already declared their willingness to underwrite loans, one of them being English and the other German.

M. De Witte's Statement. St. Petersburg, July 18.—M. De Witte, the senior Russian peace negotiator, in an interview, yesterday at his villa, at Yalagin island, repudiated the interpretation of his appointment as an indication that Russia had decided to make peace at any price. He frankly admitted that he himself favored peace, and that in fact he was for peace before the war broke out, but declared that if the Japanese demand, which is the amount of the Russian people, or which paralyze their future as a nation, Russia would accept the verdict, and the Russian people would be ready to continue the war for years, if necessary. "Russia," he said, "is not in a position to be on the verge of dissolution as a great power, and is not obliged to accept any conditions reverses in spite of the military reverses she has sustained. We are passing through an internal crisis, which has been marked by many grave events, and which may have others still in store, but the crisis will pass, and her place as a preponderant power in European concert."

HER VANITY KILLED HER. She Deceived Him, So He Murdered Her. La Junta, Colorado, July 18.—John Schillolista, who slew his bride five months, and threw her body by the links of the golf club in Arlington, Mass., is under arrest here. To Sheriff Burt, who captured him on the Santa Fe track, he has made a complete confession. His crime, he says, was the outcome of an act of deception which his wife practiced upon him. When he courted her, she represented she was twenty-eight years of age, and had \$600 in the bank, whereas, after the wedding, he learned she possessed only \$220 cash and that her age was forty. Schillolista will be taken to Massachusetts for trial.

IN BAD PLIGHT

Russians on Saghalien Mus t Surrender.

COMPLETE RAILWAY LANDED BY JAPS AT KORSAKOVSK.

Japanese on Saghalien Number 14,000—They Enter Olga Bay—Peace Negotiations Will Hinge on Indemnity—To Be Paid Japan by Russia.

Special to the Whig. London, July 18.—A dispatch to the Telegraph, from Tokio, says that the surrender of the Standard on the island of Saghalien is hourly expected. They are now in a hopeless plight.

Bombarding Naibuch. St. Petersburg, July 18.—Gen. Linvitch, under date of July 16th, reports that the Japanese, on July 14th, were bombarding Naibuch, on the south-east coast of the island of Saghalien.

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JOINED CATHOLIC CHURCH.

Sister of Bishop Potter, Changes Communion.

New York, July 18.—Much interest was shown in social and ecclesiastical circles in the report which reached this city that Mrs. Lant Thompson, sister of Bishop Potter, has joined the Roman Catholic church.

William Wilkinson, a young farm hand, committed suicide at Peterboro, N.H. An outbreak of typhoid plague is suspected on a British steamer in New York harbor.

PROPOSED INCREASES. Ottawa, July 18.—The Dominion government has increased the salary of the premier from \$8,000 to \$12,000 a year, and the leader of the opposition will get \$5,000. Members of parliament will get \$2,500, instead of \$1,500, as formerly, and privy councillors who have served the full five years as cabinet minister will be entitled to a life annuity equal to one half of his official salary.

MASHER CRUSHED. Imprisonment for Speaking to a Woman. New York, July 18.—A six months' sentence to prison for a passing street flirtation with a married woman was imposed on Benjamin F. Smith, who came here from St. Louis. Mrs. Grace Gamble, who is handsome and dresses stylishly, was waiting by appointment for her husband, a Brooklyn business man, at the Madison avenue and 42nd street subway entrance.

RIOTING IN KRONSTADT. Fourteen Bomb Factories in St. Petersburg. London, July 18.—Desperate rioting occurred, yesterday, in Kronstadt, according to a despatch received by a news agency here. It is stated that the riotous sailors attacked and looted nine public buildings, despite the efforts of the police. Many were killed and wounded, but the exact number is unknown.

EXCLUDE LABOR VOTE. And Russian Industry Will Suffer. Special to the Whig. St. Petersburg, July 18.—Representatives of Russian trade and industry met yesterday afternoon, to discuss the political situation of the country. M. Kovalesky, ex-assistant minister of finance, and one of M. De Witte's most prominent opponents, presided. The preliminary speeches largely centered on the effect of M. Boulighin's scheme upon the labor vote, it was declared would disastrously affect Russian industry.

Stokes-Pastor Wedding. Special to the Whig. Noroton, Conn., July 18.—The Rev. Harriet Pastor, the Jewish poetress and former war-maker, and J. G. Phelps Stokes, a member of the multi-millionaire Stokes family of New York, culminated in their wedding, to-day, at the home of the bridegroom's parents. The wedding was of the simplest character, though attended by quite a large number of guests, including relatives of the two families and mutual friends.

Visit Of An Artist. J. D. Aarons, English water color artist, is visiting Kingston, with a choice collection of his landscape and marine. He is a graduate of the National Gallery of London, Eng., and has had the advantage of Sir Frederick Leighton's criticisms. He has with him several historical bits of England and Scotland, notably Windsor Castle, from the massive building with a late heavy summer afternoon effect. Durham cathedral, with its stately towers, is shown to great advantage and the surrounding landscape of special merit.

Made Long Swim. Peterboro, Ont., July 18.—A feat which will live for many years in the annals of Canadian sport was performed yesterday, when H. T. Strickland, Toronto, swam from Lakefield to the big lake, a distance of over nine miles, establishing a Canadian record for long distance swimming. He had no rest. The time was 5 hours and 5 minutes. G. H. Corsan, Toronto, swam eight miles.

EVENTS OF THE DAY GIVEN IN THE BRIEFEST POSSIBLE FORM.

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PREMIER WHITNEY

Approves of Raise in Salaries.

Toronto, July 18.—Premier Whitney, discussing the decision to advance the salaries of the judges to increase the Dominion sessional industry, and to pay a salary to the leader of the opposition, to-day, said he quite approved of the plan adopted by the Dominion government.

DYNAMITE IN STOVE. Chatham Woman's Narrow Escape—Had Been Warned.

Chatham, Ont., July 18.—Mrs. Geo. Carwell had a narrow escape from death on Sunday. Some persons placed a charge dynamite in the kitchen stove during the night. When she was getting breakfast there was an explosion and the stove was blown to pieces.

IN RICH ARRAY. The Satin and Lace Beggar's Style. New York, July 18.—Michael Rocero, arrested for begging on the streets, who had \$500 in cash and a bank book showing a deposit of \$1,500 in his pockets when taken into custody, came to trial with a lawyer and accompanied by a wife and daughter.

SLAYS Foe IN CHURCH. Shoots to Demonstrate He is Best in the Place. Beatyville, Ky., July 18.—John Miller, of Breathitt county, shot and killed James Gress and wounded James M. Thomas during a fight in a church on Friday Creek, Lee county, Miller entered the church, according to the report received, and announced that he was the best man in the house, Gress and Thomas disputed this, and the shooting followed.

Largest Rose Tree. Berlin, July 18.—Herr Wehrle, a gardener at Freiburg, possesses the largest rose-tree in Europe. He obtained it in 1881, and grafted a tea-rose to it. The tree made great progress, and in the following year bore twenty-seven buds. In 1897 it covered eighty-three square metres, and in 1905 it covered 6,300 buds. In 1898 the buds increased to 7,400, and in 1899 to 9,000, and in 1900 the space covered was eighty-nine square metres and it bore 10,000 buds. It is in full bloom at the present time.

An Insane Freak. Calais, July 18.—A miner, Emmanuel Beaumont, has committed suicide by throwing himself down a pit 900 feet deep in Lens, in the Pas de Calais. He has received his fortnight's pay, and was returning home when he discovered that he had lost his purse. He, assisted by comrades, searched for his purse. Changed at not finding his money, Beaumont, without a word, jumped into the pit and threw himself into the abyss. His body was frightfully mutilated.

Three Thieves Killed. Lishon, July 18.—After a large party of tourists on automobiles had alighted for a picnic, several thieves jumped into the foremost car and went off. Several of the picnic party jumped into the remaining automobile and gave chase. After several miles the automobile containing the thieves, which was erratically steered, went over a precipice 200 feet high. The corpses of the motor-lifters, three in number, were terribly mangled.

Made A Good Record. Niagara Falls, July 18.—Carlisle D. Graham, of this city, and William J. Glover, Jr., of Baltimore, Md., successfully swam the lower rapids of the Niagara river from the American side of the whirlpool to Lewiston, yesterday afternoon. Glover beat Graham by four minutes. The distance of four miles was covered in twenty-six minutes by the former.

Death Of Charles Garth. Special to the Whig. Montreal, July 18.—Charles Garth, president of the Windsor hotel company, died this morning. He established the Dominion Metal works, many years ago, which was afterwards changed to the firm name of Charles Garth & Co., when he was joined by his brother in 1875. Mr. Garth was eighty-three years of age.
