# SHOT 'GEE

## Deed Of A Doctor's Wife In Ingersoll.

### GAVE HERSELF UP

#### SHE FIRED THREE SHOTS AT THE MAN.

He Died After Running a Short Distance—His Short Life Was Largely a Failure—He Spent Terms in Several Prisons.

Special to the Whig. Ingersoll, Ont., July 18.—Mrs. Emilie Kyle, wife of Dr. Kyle, shot and killed David McGee, just outside her home, this morning. She fired three shots from her revolver; the first missed, the other two took effect. McGee was seen of John McGee, of Ottawa, who lived in Ingersoll up to ten years ago. His family are highly respected, but his life was largely a failure. Eight years ago he was sent to Woodstock jail for assaulting Policeman McConnell and was sent to Central prison, at Toronto, and a couple of years ago was arrested for abducting a Miss McIntyre, of Toronto, and sentenced to a term in prison.

About a month ago he returned to Ingersoll and had been here ever since. He was not working and hung around the Kyle home where he had not food up till about a week ago, when Mr. Kyle ordered him away, saying to his drinking and threatening to smash in the windows of the Kyle house.

This morning, within less than fifteen minutes after Kyle had for work, McGee appeared. Mrs. Kyle told him to leave, but McGee did not comply, whereupon the woman got a revolver from the dresser and fired three shots at him.

#### PITH OF THE NEWS.

### The Very Latest Culled From All Over The World.

It was eighty-one degrees at 11 p.m. last night in New York.

Roger W. Landry, who shot and killed Frank Lemphire at Buffalo, on July 9th, gave himself up.

Dr. Frank Clarke, an American, is imprisoned at Kingston, Jamaica, charged with photographing the church at Bamseus, is accused of dumping to America with church funds.

Octave Dupuis, a prosperous farmer of Monroci, eight miles from Manitowish, up the Gatineau, was smothered to death in a fire.

The Kaiser is about to visit King Christian of Denmark. He will remain in Danish waters from July 20th to July 24th and discuss the Scandinavian crisis.

An injunction has been served on Captain Vieger, restraining him from soliciting patronage at Thousand Island Park. The steamboat manager makes a claim of unjust discrimination.

William F. Hubbard, aged twenty-eight, a forest assistant in the forest service of the department of agriculture, and formerly of Toronto, was drowned in the Potomac river near Great Falls, Md.

Gustave Heuter, a retired San Francisco merchant, was shot and killed at his home in the Santa Cruz mountains near Patehen, Cal. A coroner's jury pronounced Mrs. Heuter, who said the shooting was done in self-defense.

Thomas F. Ryan, who recently purchased the stock holdings of James H. Hyde, has made an agreement with the three trustees of the Ryan holdings, and the newly elected directors to sell the stock he purchased to the Equitable society.

John Maher, forty years old, was killed while stringing wires in Avenue D. Maher was a hewer in the employ of the Rochester Railway & Electric Light company, and was at the top of a pole when he received a shock from a live wire.

An edict has been issued appointing a Chinese to constitute an embassy, who will start on his inspection of the countries of the leading powers, for the purpose of studying economic and political questions.

Finding fault with his breakfast, Lewis Bardsley, Altoona, Pa., aged twenty-four, but recently married, told his wife that he was going to end his life. Bardsley went to his bedroom and drank two ounces of laudanum, dying. He was an inveterate cigarette smoker.

During the annual international automobile race from Turin, via Susa, up Mount Cenis, which was won by Nazari, on a fat machine, private and automobile collided with a wall, and was overturned. The benzine tank exploded and the three occupants of the car were killed.

**Chicago Yawl Here.**  
The yawl Vannessa, of Chicago, arrived here last evening from Chicago, with its owner and party aboard. It is making a trip from Chicago to the Gulf of the St. Lawrence, and thence to New York. The visitors were entertained at the Yacht Club House this morning they proceeded down the river.

**Forty Persons Drowned.**  
Special to the Whig. Lahore, India, July 18.—A fishing boat, plying on Achore Lake, capsized, while carrying a party of pleasure-makers, and forty persons were drowned.

**Six Burned To Death.**  
Special to the Whig. Wabasha, Minn., July 18.—The Depot Hotel was totally destroyed this morning. Six persons were burned to death.

R. Jamieson has stopped operations for the present in his oil well experiment in Perth. He has gone down to a depth of over 500 feet—the capacity of his machine—and will get another machine more powerful in drilling before proceeding further.

# RELIGION OF JAPAN.

## About to Throw Off Her Old Belief.

Boston, Mass., July 18.—Rev. C. H. Patton, D.D., home secretary of the American Board of Foreign Missions, is asking five experts to furnish him with statements in reference to the present world outlook. Dr. J. D. Davison, Kyoto, in replying for Japan, says that the nation is on the verge of choosing between Christianity and nothing, the old religions having become effete, Buddhism is pronounced moribund by prominent Buddhists, and has lost its power over young Japan. Shintoism is dis-established and now declared not to be a religion. The Confucian ethics are found to be effete, and great educational leaders are declaring that a new basis of morality must be found and taught. After quoting from recent utterances of such men as Marquis Ito, Baron Moeijima, a former member of the cabinet, and Inouye Enryo, all of whom agree that Japan must have a positive religion to replace what she has lost, and that the religion of Christ is most full of promise for the nation, Dr. Davis concludes:

"As Japan goes, so will Eastern Asia. The Japanese church is to be a powerful factor in the civilization of the Christianization of Korea and China. The only discouraging thing about the future is that the workers and the resources are inadequate. The work is being crippled when it should be doubled.

The adequate endowment of the Doshisha College will bring results ten times greater than a like sum spent on any college in the United States. The same may be said of Kobe College for young women. In helping and saving not only the five hundred million of the three empires of Eastern Asia."

# WILL GO TO ASYLUM

## WIFE MURDERER WILL ESCAPE STATES PRISON.

All His Associates Believe Daniel Grey to be Crazy—Attempted to Kill Woman With Whom He Lived.

Special to the Whig. Detroit, July 18.—By the testimony of the Drullard woman, with whom he has infatuated, and with that of his associates during several months of dissipation and debauchery, all of whom believe him to be crazy, probably will come the evidence that will send Daniel Grey, murderer of his wife, to an asylum, instead of states prison.

It is alleged that Grey made at least two attempts to kill Miss Drullard, but was pacified, and dissuaded by her, and after killing his wife he sought the Drullard girl, but was unable to find her.

It is believed by Grey's acquaintances that he would have killed the girl, too. The Drullard girl is the daughter of wealthy and respected parents, living on the Canadian side of the river.

# CLOSE NEXT MONTH.

## Premier Balfour's Advice to His Supporters.

Special to the Whig. London, July 18.—Premier Balfour has dispensed the expectation of an early dissolution of Parliament. At a meeting of unionists, today, the premier urged his supporters to be regular in their attendance at the House of Commons so as to prevent the defeat of any government as the result of snap decisions. He pointed out that a dissolution in August would be inconvenient to the house and to the country. The premier said he did not anticipate any trouble in bringing the session to close in the week ending August 12th.

# A Powerful Hymn.

The world knows Martin Luther as a reformer; comparatively few know him as musician and hymnologist, writes Allan Sutherland in the Delimitator. Luther wrote thirty-seven hymns and psalm revisions, and these have been translated into many languages. His masterpiece was a great hymn, "The Great Hymn of the Reformation," which is as dear to the German heart as the fatherland itself. This hymn accomplished as much for the reformation as did the translation of the Bible. D'Arbigny says that "it was sung in all the churches of Saxony, and its energetic strains often revived and inspired the most dejected hearts." It was sung at Luther's funeral, and his first line is carved on his tomb. It was first published about 1527, and has been translated at least eighty times, doubtless the most accurate being the version of Thomas Carlisle. Kostlin has well written: "This hymn is Luther in song. It is pitched in the very key of the man—rugged and majestic, grand in God, and confident, speaking out the powers of the earth and under the earth, an all-conquering conviction of divine vocation and empowerment."

# CONSUMERS ELECTRIC PLANT

Purchased by the City of Ottawa.

Special to the Whig. Ottawa, July 18.—Ottawa now owns and is operating a civic electric light plant. Last night council authorized the purchase of the Consumers' Electric plant for \$200,000, and this morning the city treasurer handed over debentures covering the amount and the company handed over the key. The present company officials have been left in charge until permanent officials are appointed. The aldermen at the deal is said to be due to a desire to head off possible injunctions.

# FAVOR A REGENCY

## And the Deposition of the Czar.

St. Petersburg, July 18.—A sensational rumor is current here, to-day that a large party of the zemstvo and the Duma are in the favor of the deposition of Emperor Nicholas, and the establishment of a regency for the Grand Duke Alexiandrovich, the infant son of the emperor and heir to the throne, under grand tutelage. It is alleged that for this reason the meeting of all Russian socialists and Dumaist congress, which was to take place at Moscow, has been postponed.

## After Matter of Last Week's Riot in New York.
