

The Tapling Collection of Postage Stamps-A Racy Sketch in Lloyd's Weekly.

One is St. George standing on the dragon, and piercing it with his spear; another leader in profile-a chain round his neck, with an orb and three crosses issuing; and a pair of busts of a man and woman in walnut, fine as fine art can be. Baron Anselm de Rothschild obtained the last-mentioned works from the sculptor. All the carvings noticed are German; and the elder Boehm bought the busts in Prague at the triffing cost of four shillings. Likewise in the same collection can be seen portrait carvings in honestone, alike curious and beautifully artistic.
