COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

The failure in Canada for the past week was 19: to 1904, 20.

The Toronto hop market is dull, with choice lots quoted at 24c. to 27c.

The Toronto honey market is quiet, and prices firm at 7 1/2 to 8c. per lb. Comb honey, 11.75 to 12c. per lb.

John W. Gates, who is here, says that among other good stocks he is a bull on Canadian Pacific, and that a man who buys it now will double his money in ten years.

The C.P.R. car shops at Montreal are building new box cars at the rate of fifteen a day, nearly a thousand having been turned out during the last two months.

The Sydney, N.S., city council has decided to grant a free site to the two-million-dollar ship-building enterprise promoted by English capitalists, headed by Messrs. Mayne and Gladstone.

Stocks in London are rising fast in the Fraser River. The average per boat is increasing daily, and high boats are catching 100. Traps on the Fraser River are making average catches of 2,000.

"Of one thing I am already satisfied, Canada has enough pulp wood to supply the world forever," was the statement made in Toronto, by Herr A. Scheck, a commissioner of the German government.

The United States Steel Corporation is now beginning to receive large orders for material from railroad companies which have made up their minds that cranes are assured and that they can safely contract ahead for requirements for next year.

Next to the common stock the highest issue the Grand Trunk has is the 4 per cent. preferred consolidated common stock. It amounts to \$15,104,781. It fluctuates but little in price; indeed, in the last six years has not varied more than nine points.

Richfield and Ontario stock has been showing a fair degree of strength lately on report that the company is having a pretty prosperous season. From Montreal comes a statement from interested close to the management that up to last week earnings were \$20,000 in excess of earnings for the same period last year.

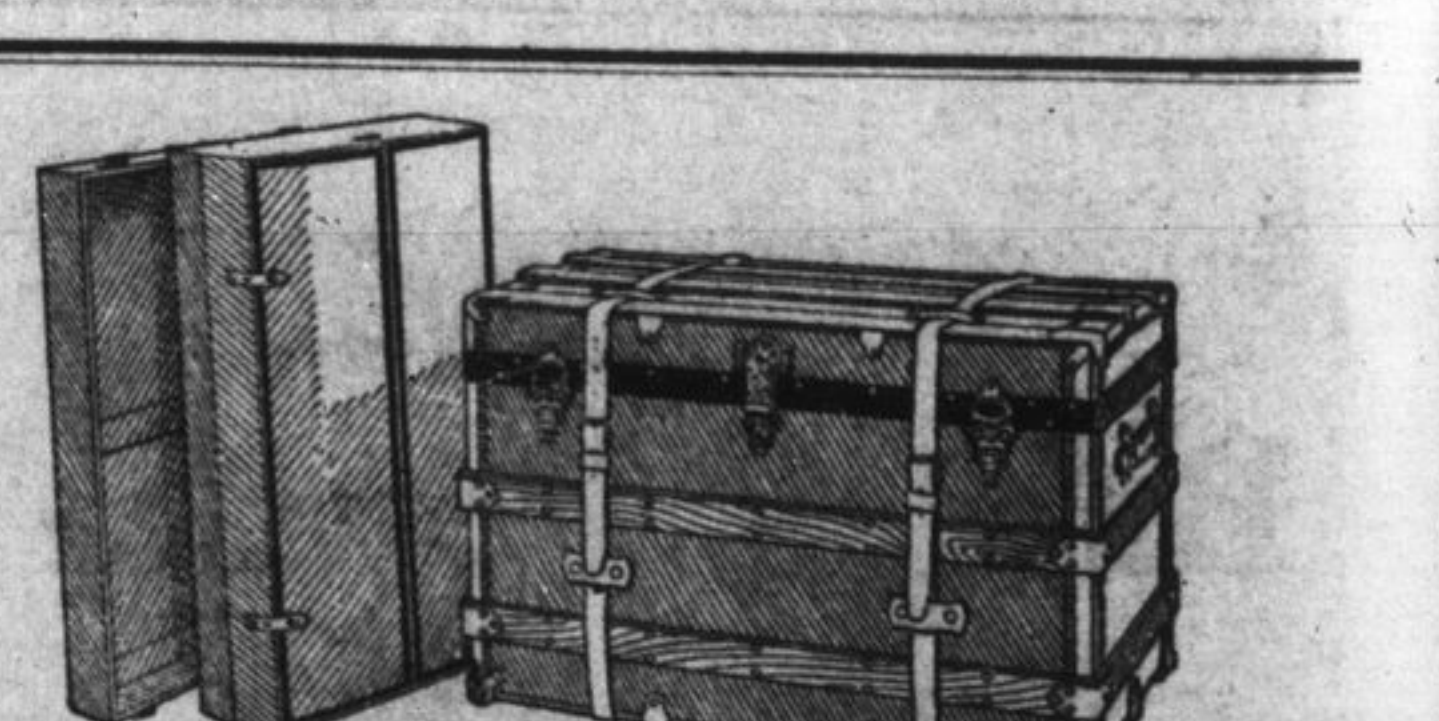
