They display a tendency, however, to regard their meeting with some uneasiness.

Had To Meet On Sea. Berlin, July 24 .- The meeting of the kaiser is the exclusive object of the czar's journey. The czar expressed a desire to consult the kaiser, and the sea was selected as the meeting place, as the czar cannot go to Germany, nor can the kaiser go to Russia, on account of the political condition. These are established facts.

To Advise Peace. Berlin, July 24.-The foreign office, here, is advised that the meeting between Emperor William and Emperor Nickolas took place, to-day, off the Swedish coast. It is authoritatively stated that Emperor William will continue to advise peace.
