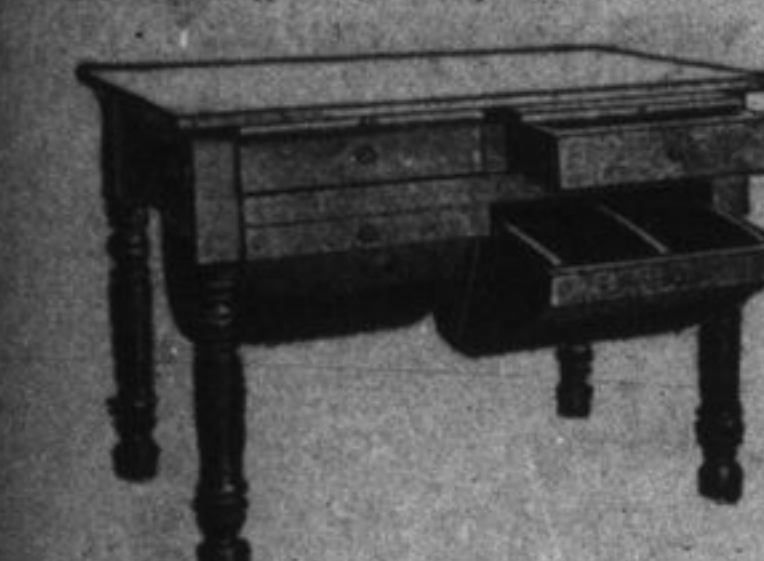

BLAZE IN AN HOTEL

R. H. EARLE WAS BADLY BURNED.

His Bed Caught Fire—Sufferer Taken to the Hotel Dieu—The Room Was Almost Destroyed.

In a fire in his room at the Anglo-American hotel, on Sunday afternoon, R. H. Earle, a well-known hotelier, was badly burned. The bed clothes caught fire, evidently from a lighted cigar, while Mr. Earle was dozing, and the flames soon enveloped the bed. Before he could get to safety, Mr. Earle's legs and arms were frightfully burned. His calls for help soon brought assistance, and a telephone message was sent to the fire stations. The brigade was quickly on the scene, and two streams were laid from the corner of King and Ontario streets, and carried into the hotel through the lane entrance at the rear. There was so much smoke that it was difficult to tell how far the fire had extended, and water was poured in for ten minutes. The fire was then completely out, the room in which it originated was in the portion of the building occupied by the United States consular office, which suffered somewhat by the water pouring through the ceiling. The bedroom was destroyed. The damage will amount to \$500, and is covered by insurance. The hotel is owned by Miss McGill.

Two doctors were called to attend Mr. Earle, whom they found to be very severely burned from the elbows down. The skin of the left leg was almost completely peeled off, while patches were burned off the other leg and the arms. R. J. Reid's ambulance conveyed the injured man to the Hotel Dieu.

A large crowd witnessed the operations of the firemen, whose movements were exceedingly rapid. Ladders were up and the line of hose from the King street was laid in a twinkling, the stream being into the building half a minute after the brigade had arrived. This morning, Mr. Earle was much better. He had a narrow escape. Had he arrived a minute later, he would have been burned to death. At the same time the hotel would have been doomed, for the fire was rapidly shooting upwards when discovered.

TRAIN BUMPED ALONG.

The Azle Was Broken on the Trip.

The G.T.R. mail train from the east, on Saturday afternoon, met with an accident which fortunately ended without disaster. East of Rideau station the axle of a rear truck on a passenger coach, broke. A passenger pulled the bell cord, but the engineer did not hear it and for a mile the coach bumped and jostled along, frightening the occupants. Near Kingston Mills the train was stopped, and the disabled coach and a Pullman were left, while the balance of the train came to Kingston.

DISPUTED DECISION

CAUSED THE CALLING OF A BASEBALL MATCH.

Between the Irishmen and the R.C.F.A. in the Second Innings—The Soldiers Refused to Continue With the Umpire.

The city league baseball match on Saturday afternoon ended in a fizzle. So far this year the amateur city league games have gone on without a hitch and everything seemed to favor the weekly matches. Fine weather, good crowds, better games, and plenty of spectators gave promise of an excellent season's sport, and the call of baseball was becoming better and better each week until now the game is played quite scientifically. Hence it is to be hoped that Saturday's squabble is the first and last to mar a summer's sport.

Of course the present circumstances are a little out of the ordinary as an umpire's decision should be final. A meeting will be called to discuss the matter and the probable result that the game will be ordered to be played again.

According to the latest report of the minister of education for Ontario, there are 122 Queen's graduates teaching in 116 of the province's high schools. This is an increase of thirty-five since 1901. Of those holding specialist certificates, there are twenty-nine from the department of science, twenty-three from the department of modern languages, while classics and mathematics each show a total of nineteen. About nineteen per cent. of the total number of high school teachers of Ontario are Queen's graduates.
