Boulton and Miss Schroeder have one thing in common-their activity for what they conceive to be the best rights of the people. Miss Schroeder has been engaged in work for the amelioration of the conditions of the poor, and has become a convert to the collectivist idea of government, being a member of the Collectivist club of New York-some would call her a socialist. It was the identity of their aims which led to their first meeting, and their present engagement,
