COVERS VANISH.

VICTIM OF A MADDENING MIDNIGHT MYSTERY.

Wherever He Sleeps, in the Middle of the Night His Bedclothing Disappears and Is Never Found. Marysville, Ky., July 29.—Since February, 1903, nearly every time Stuart Crane has drawn the draperies of his couch about him and laid down in hope of pleasant dreams, he has been awakened by the disappearance of the draperies. Moreover, he has never been able to find the draperies. Often in hotels in various parts of this glorious republic he has been compelled to pay for job lots of bed clothing whisked from above his manly form at midnight's blackest hour by unseen means. The mystery has got on his nerves and Crane is in hospital here, suffering from nervous prostration and telling his remarkable story. Crane is a traveler for a Cincinnati wholesale firm. More than a dozen times he has been mysteriously vanishing in as many widely separated hotels. Sometimes he has been accused of stealing them. Never has he been able to account for them. Sometimes he thinks himself pursued by a mysterious enemy bent on wrecking his reason. Sometimes he fancies malicious spooks are playing uncanny pranks on him. Often he pinches himself to make sure he is not a spook himself. Always he is puzzled, never he is distracted by the mystery. In Jackson, O., Crane pinned the bed clothes to the mattress. He awoke at three o'clock a.m. and the bed clothes were gone. For the next three nights Crane stopped at Caldwell, Cambridge and New Philadelphia. The bed clothes disappeared at each place. When he arrived at Youngstown he was almost a raving maniac. He was taken to the hospital, and that night, although there were four nurses in the ward, the bed clothes disappeared from his cot.

Medical College Changes. Queen's Medical Faculty had a meeting yesterday afternoon to arrange for the filling of the chair of clinical medicine, vacant by the death of Dr. Herald. It was decided to unite the departments of practice of medicine and clinical medicine with Dr. Third and Dr. Campbell as professors. They will make whatever other arrangements they may think necessary. Dr. Ross was appointed to succeed Dr. Campbell in the department of materia medica and pharmacology. Dr. Richardson will take Dr. Ross' place as demonstrator in practical anatomy and Dr. Dalton will become assistant demonstrator in anatomy.

Accident to Steamer Toronto. Considerable excitement was caused on the arrival of the steamer Toronto in Toronto on Friday. She came in at the dock and attempted to climb out on the dock. Nearly all the steel beams on the port side connecting the hull with the main deck were torn away as far as the paddle box. The dock caught the first bray, and the passengers had a rocky ride. Several deck hands jumped ashore. The engine bells went wrong, and when the first mate on the bridge, gave the signal to reverse it rang in the engine room, "Full Speed Ahead."

Shot in the Neck. Roy Davis, of Pittsburg, Met. With A. Accident. Roy Davis, the eighty-year-old son of Mrs. John Davis, Pittsburg, and nephew of Capt. Davis, of this city, was brought to the General Hospital, Friday afternoon, suffering from a bullet wound in the neck. He had been in the street, following a shooting match, and the latter accidentally discharged the rifle while it pointed at the other little fellow. The bullet, a small one, entered the front of his neck, escaped the dangerous vessels, and lodged near the back of the neck near the spinal chord. Dr. Campbell held an X-ray examination and located the bullet, but found it in too dangerous a position as to remove it. The wound will simply be treated, and the bullet allowed to remain, as it is not likely to cause any trouble.

Rain vs. Hay. The heavy rain of last night and this morning proved very damaging to the agricultural interests of this district. It caught the farmers unawares. Much hay had been cut and on the ground, of course, it will never be the same in quality. As for the barley, hay, etc., that remained standing, it was beaten and bruised far more than one would imagine. The loss of this year's crop will represent a large financial loss to the residents of the rural districts to say nothing of the falling off in the quality of the hay offered for sale next spring.

London, July 29.—George Meredith, Sir George Newnes, Sir Gilbert Parker, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle and other well-known persons of the literary world, have formed a committee to raise a fund in behalf of the late Bro. Hart's daughter, Ethel, whose health has become seriously undermined.

Admission to the grounds will be free by cars.

RUSKIN'S FINE SENTIMENT.

Condemnation of Money Madness Well Worth Reading. From "The Crown of Wild Olive." Following the conclusion of Miss Tarbell's character sketch of John D. Rockefeller in the pages of the August McTear's is a short quotation from John Ruskin. It has no connection in form with the Rockefeller article, but coming upon these living words of Ruskin's fresh from Miss Tarbell's powerful narrative of the strange man who has so lucrily analyzed, in a measure, understood, and the pitiable figure of Ruskin's words is seen in a new light: "We do great injustice to Iscariot in thinking him wicked above all common wickedness. He was only a common money-lover, and, like all money-lovers, didn't understand Christ. He didn't want Him to be killed. He was horror-struck when he found that Christ would be killed, threw his money away instantly, and hanged himself. How many of our present money-seekers, think you, would have the grace to hang themselves whoever was killed? But Judas was a common, selfish, muddle-headed, pilfering fellow. He didn't understand Christ; yet he believed in Him much more than most of us do; had seen Him do miracles, thought He was quite strong enough to fight for Himself, and he, Judas, might as well make his own little by-persecutes out of the affair. Now, that is the money-seeker's idea all over the world. He doesn't hate Christ, but he doesn't care for Him—sees no good in that benevolent business; he makes his own little job out of it at all events, come what will. And thus, of every mass of men, you have a certain number of bagmen, whose main object is to make money. And they do make it—make it in all sorts of unfair ways, chiefly by the weight and force of money itself, or what is called the power of capital. That is the modern Judas' way of 'carrying the bag,' and 'bearing what is put therein.'"

Should Have A Holiday. Kingston, July 29.—(To the Editor): Let our loyalty to the city and the mayor's proclamation, should be questioned, when our absence from the festive scenes are noted, permit us to explain the reason thereof. The order has gone forth that all prison employees must work all day Monday, because the city is in a state of emergency in the city limits, no heed will be taken of the civic holiday proclamation, though nine-tenths of the employees reside in the city.

Most of the guards have friends coming to the Kingston, between to-day and Tuesday, and naturally they would like to spend an hour or two with the visitors; those who have not friends would like to join with their fellow citizens in attending the sports, but we are debarred and ordered to report for duty.
